**ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION**

of the WESTERN PUBLISHING COMPANY. KNOW ALL MEN BY THESE PRESENTS:

That we, B. M. Thomas, Lloyd C. Thomas and John W. Thomas, citizens of the United States, and residing in the state of Nebraska, do hereby associate ourselves together for the purpose of forming and becoming a corporation in the state of Nebraska, for the purposes of the transaction of the business hereinafter described.

**ARTICLE I.**

The name of this corporation shall be the Western Publishing company.

**ARTICLE II.**

(a) The principal place of transacting its business shall be at Alliance, Box Butte county, Nebraska.

(b) Branch offices may be maintained at such other places in the state of Nebraska as the board of directors may determine where meetings of incorporators, stockholders and directors may be held and all business transacted.

**ARTICLE III.**

The purposes for which said corporation is to be formed are as follows:

(a) To engage in the printing and publishing business; to own, operate, publish, issue, sell or buy newspapers, magazines or other periodicals; to buy, sell, own and use all manner of office supplies.

(b) To own, operate, sell or buy printing plants and printing machinery of any kind or nature.

(c) To take, lease, purchase, hire or otherwise acquire and to hold, use, sell, lease, exchange, mortgage, improve and develop real estate, real property and any interest or right therein, and to construct or to have constructed such houses and buildings as is necessary for carrying on and conducting said business, and to buy, sell, own, use, manage, operate and lease the same or similar structures.

(d) To borrow money, with or without security, and for the repayment of the same, to give the obligations of this corporation with any necessary or required security, and to lend money, with or without security, and to do anything whatsoever necessary, useful, desirable, convenient, or auxiliary to any of the purposes of this corporation.

**ARTICLE IV.**

(a) The authorized capital stock of this corporation shall be Twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000.00) divided into two hundred and fifty (250) shares of the par value of one hundred dollars (\$100.00) each.

(b) The amount of capital stock with which said corporation will begin business is ten thousand dollars (\$10,000.00).

(c) At such time as the board of directors may by resolution direct said capital stock shall be paid into this corporation, either in cash or by the sale and transfer to it of real or personal property, contracts, services, or any other valuable right or thing for the use and purposes of said corporation, in payment for which shares of the capital stock of said corporation may be issued and the capital stock so issued shall thereupon and thereby become and be fully paid up the same as though paid for in cash at par, and shall be non-assessable forever, and the judgment of the directors as to the value of any property, right or thing acquired in exchange for capital stock shall be conclusive.

**ARTICLE V.**

The existence of this corporation shall commence on the first day of July 1918, and continue for a period of fifty (50) years hereafter, unless sooner dissolved by a vote of two-thirds of the stock thereof.

**ARTICLE VI.**

The highest amount of indebtedness to which said corporation may at any time subject itself shall not exceed two-thirds of the capital stock.

**ARTICLE VII.**

The annual meeting of the stock-

holders of this corporation shall be held on the first Monday in February in each year, at which meeting the directors of the company shall be elected, and such other lawful business done as the stockholders may deem necessary and proper.

**ARTICLE VIII.**

(a) The officers of said corporation shall be a president, vice president, secretary and treasurer. The office of secretary and treasurer may be held by the same person. The officers shall be chosen by the board of directors, and shall hold their office for the period of one year and until their successors are elected and qualified. The business of said corporation shall be conducted by a board of directors to be elected annually from among the stockholders.

(b) The directors for the first year or until their successors are chosen will be B. M. Thomas, Lloyd C. Thomas, John W. Thomas.

**PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT**

The following proposed amendment to the constitution of the State of Nebraska, as hereinafter set forth in full, is submitted to the electors of the State of Nebraska to be voted upon at the general election to be held Tuesday, November 5th, A. D. 1918:

**A JOINT RESOLUTION** to amend Section one (1) of Article seven (7) of the Constitution of the State of Nebraska.

Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Nebraska: Section 1. That Section One of Article Seven of the Constitution of the State of Nebraska be and the same hereby is amended by striking out the following words:

"Second. Persons of foreign birth who shall have declared their intention to become citizens conformably to the laws of the United States, on the subject of naturalization, at least thirty days prior to an election."

And inserting in the place of the words so stricken, the following words:

"Second. Persons of foreign birth who shall have become citizens of the United States by naturalization or otherwise conformably to the laws of the United States at least thirty days prior to an election."

Sec. 2. That at the general election nineteen hundred and eighteen (1918) there shall be submitted to the electors of the state for their approval or rejection the foregoing proposed amendment to the constitution relating to the right of suffrage. At such election, on the ballot of each elector voting for or against said proposed amendment, shall be written or printed the words: "For proposed amendment to the constitution relating to the right of suffrage."

Sec. 3. If such amendment shall be approved by a majority of all electors voting at such election, said amendment shall constitute Section One (1) Article Seven (7) of the Constitution of the State of Nebraska.

**LOCAL NEWS**

The statistics of the production of potash for the first six months of 1918 received by the United States geological survey, department of the interior, to date show a total output of 20,000 to 25,000 short tons of pure potash (K 20), indicating that the output for the entire year may reach 50,000 to 60,000 tons. As only 32,573 tons was produced in 1917 the production is evidently increasing rapidly. The domestic production now equals 20 to 25 % of the normal domestic consumption before the war, which is estimated to have been about 240,000 tons. The statistics for the first half of the year are not complete, for returns have not been received from a few large producers, and it is possible that the production in 1918 may exceed 60,000 tons, for reports made to the survey indicate that a number of new enterprises may be put into operation during the second half of the year.

Ed Reardon, who left Alliance many months ago with the boys of company G, is visiting relatives and friends in the city. Ed is a ranking sergeant at Fort Sill, Oklahoma, and is very much a soldier. He arrived last Friday morning and will return to his duties this week. He spent several weeks in army schools before being promoted to the responsible position which he now holds in the School of Fire at Fort Sill. Friday night Ed drilled the members of the home guards.

Evidence was taken last week before referee Judge Barton, of Pawnee City, in the case of the state of Nebraska vs. Allen G. Fisher, on disbarment charges. Judge Barnes, of Fremont, represented Mr. Fisher and Judge Fawcett, of Omaha, and E. D. Crites, of Chadron, the state. There are seven counts in the charge. One day was spent at Harrison and one day at Rushville taking testimony. Testimony is also being taken at Omaha. It will be remembered that Mr. Fisher was one of the attorneys who appeared at Alliance in the famous Omaha-Chadron Hood blackmail case.

M. L. Kincaid, of Bingham, well known ranchman, predicts excellent hunting this fall. Mr. Kincaid, who was in the city on Saturday, says that there are millions of young ducks on the sandhill lakes. He also says that it takes him longer to make a trip to either of his county seats—Rushville or Oshkosh, than it does to go to Chicago.

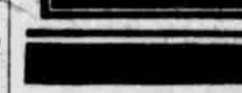
