HOGS HIGHER THAN EVER SHEEP AND LAMBS WEAKEN ARMY DEMAND HEAVY

Union Stockyards, Omaha, Nebr. Sept. 19th.—The trade has trained itself to heavy receipts and any material letup in the supply will be quickly followed by higher prices.

Packers, shippers and feeders are good buyers for all kinds of fat stock and feeders weighing 950 pounds and upwards that have quality and flesh.

The Food Administration expects to lower the standard of weights by next month which will help the lighter steers, and a meeting has been called to discuss the hog and corn propositions for next year. Everything still points to high prices for everything, but we are liable to have declines most any time during the fall months when continuous heavy receipts, congestions or lack of railroad facilities are in evidence.

Sandhill cattle are moving freely, are in good condition and selling well. Wyoming and South Dakota cattle are better than ever and prices reached the highest points ever known with top fat steers \$17.75; top yearlings \$12.00; top cows \$12.00.

The common to fair light steers and heifers are the slowest to move and with grain and roughness comparatively scarce we believe these grades will sell at greater discounts than usual.

All who have the feed should keep all the young stock and raise all they can as the world will need and take everything at high prices for a number of years. We are bound to have large runs during October and November, but this has been largely discounted and it is mostly a question of being able to handle the receipts than the price. Packers will continue to buy the "killing" kinds as fast as they can be handled and we don't know of any better advice than to

ship whenever you have any stock ready and you can get the cars.

The BOWLES Cattle Department is one of the best in Omaha and the patrons of this Company are its best friends and boosters. We look for a more steady and possibly a little better market for the fat cattle and fleshy feeders next week, but this is not the right time of the year to "bull" the market. Demand increasing for good calves and yearlings, and prices are certainly good.

The trade is closing firm with practically all of the early decline regained for the more desirable kinds.

Stock calves \$ 8.00 to 10.50  
Veal calves \$11.50 to 13.50  
Fat bulls \$ 7.50 to 9.50  
Feeding bulls \$ 7.25 to 8.50  
Common to fair grades at the usual discounts. Wyoming, South Dakota and selected cattle generally 25 c. to \$1.00 higher than these quotations.

The hog trade continues to make new records; top reaching \$20.35 with the bulk from \$19.65 to \$20.00. Prices may react most any time, but are liable to rule higher before we have a permanent decline.

The lamb trade felt the effects of continued heavy supplies and feeding lambs show a decline of fully 50 cents this week while fat lambs which are scarce, held steady. Demand for ewes is better because they are the lowest of all meat animals, and the trade held firm.
