Beef Steers and Heavy Feeders Are Steady-Others Somewhat Lower.

Sept. 26.-The week opened with record breaking receipts at the principal markets, but the demand is so strong for all kinds of beef steers, heavy fat cows and good to choice feeders that the trade ruled active ad prices have been well sustained.

As usual, under heavy offerings the lighter stuff and poorer grades of steers and cows suffered some decline, but all classes and conditions of cattle are still selling at good prices, and as stated by us many times, we have confidence in a comparatively good market throughout tae entire season.

The food administration has given out instructions that only steer beef that will dress 575 pounds and upwards will be used for army and navy purposes and exported to our allied forces and that the civilian classes, which means all of the people remaining in the United States, except our soldiers and navy boys, must use the lighter grades.
