

COMEBACKS

"HACK" SPENCER Edward R. "Hack" Spencer undoubtedly pulled one of the greatest comebacks that has ever been recorded in baseball annals.

The big, fabby catcher who came to the St. Louis Browns from the Waco, Tex., club away back in 1905 has had a career in the national pastime that reads like romance, and, although this year finds him in the Pacific Coast League once again, his comeback remains none the less remarkable.

Spencer was always a big, tubby sort of a catcher, and from the time he broke into fast company until he dropped out of sight of the baseball fans in 1914 he had a reputation as a happy-go-lucky citizen that ranked second to none in baseball.

Spencer's great thirst proved his undoing, but he was capable when sober and he had a habit of hitting in the pinches, though he never threatened to win a batting championship.

From 1905 to 1909 Spencer was a member of the Browns. He next played with the Red Sox, figuring in a trade for Lou Criger, and was later shunted to St. Paul, where he spent part of the season of 1909 and the 1910 season. The next year found "Hack" back again for a trial, this time with the Philadelphia Nationals. But he failed and was sent back to St. Paul. Later he played with Louisville and San Francisco.

Winding up with "Frisco" very suddenly in 1913 Spencer dropped from sight and sought a lumber camp, where he spent more than a year. He mixed it with the rough lumberjacks, and while he fought with them he was also fighting against Old King Alcohol. Finally he accepted a job tending bar in a mining town, and he knew that if he could keep away from the booze there he had won his battle. It was tough going for "Hack," but he won out, and after spending the 1915-16 seasons with the Vernon club, he came back to the big leagues a member of the Tigers.

Spencer was recently given his unconditional release by Detroit after spending the 1917-18 seasons with Hughey Jennings, during which he did yeoman service behind the bat. He is still a good catcher and should have no trouble holding his own in the big minor league of the faraway coast.
