Experiments conducted for ten years at the University of Nebraska North Platte Experimental Substation show that early seeding of spring wheat, oats, barley and em-mer in western Nebraska makes better crops than late seeding. Tests were made with four seeding dates, averaging March 25, April 6, April 18 and April 30, for ten consecutive years. The average yields of all crops were materially better from early than from late seeding. Barley outyielded all other crops, and on account of its high yielding power and high food value, its growing is advocated. Emmer, often called spelts, yielded low, and there seems little justification for growing this crop in western Nebraska. There was little difference between the values of spring wheat and early oats, either as a feed or cash crop.
