FIRST GERMAN MAILS TO DEPART TUESDAY

NEW YORK, July 17.—The first consignment of mail for Germany since America entered the war will leave here next Tuesday on the steamship United States. The United States will land at Christiania, Norway, and from there the mail will be transported to Denmark and thence into Germany.

Only first and second class and registered mail will be handled for the present, officials said. Several thousand letters already have been received.

For the present all German mail will go by way of the Scandinavian countries and Holland, with sailings about once a week. There will be no censorship on German mail.
