

LIVESTOCK PRICES AT SOUTH OMAHA

Both Corn Fed and Range Beef About Steady

HOGS SELL A DIME LOWER

Heavy Receipts of Sheep and Lambs and Prices Generally a Quarter Lower. Both Fat and Feeder Lambs Move Freely at Lower Levels.

Union Stock Yards, South Omaha, July 29.—The run of cattle was not as heavy as dealers expected for Monday, 11,700 head, three-fourths of them western rangers. Corn fed beefs ruled active and stronger, best bringing \$17.00@17.75, while western rangers were slow at last week's decline, best bringing \$14.50@15.00. Cows and heifers were steady to quarter lower and stockers and feeders steady to strong.

Some Decline in Hogs.

Receipts of hogs were moderate for the opening day of the week, 8,600 head and trade was slow with prices around a dime lower than Saturday. Tops brought \$22.40 and bulk of the trading was at \$21.50@22.00.

Lambs Largely 25c Lower.

The heaviest run of sheep and lambs of the season showed up Monday, 36,000 head, and trade was slow with prices weak to a dime lower on fat stock as well as on feeder grades. Best fat lambs brought \$16.75 and best of the feeder lambs around \$14.75.

Our Country's Birth. Our country's independence dates from July 4, 1776, because the United States then declared its independence, and from that day on has maintained it. Great Britain acknowledged the independence of the United States by a preliminary treaty of peace dated November 30, 1782, and by the final or definite treaty dated September 3, 1783. This treaty was ratified by the continental congress January 14, 1784.

Costa Rica. Costa Rica is the most southerly of the Central American republics, extending from the Atlantic to the Pacific ocean, with Cocos island as its outlying possession. It lies between Nicaragua and Panama. A considerable area of the country is high tableland with a temperate climate, but the land along the coast is low, with tropical vegetation and a strictly tropical climate.
