—The local recruiting office, located at 101 Box Butte avenue, had one of the biggest days Tuesday in the history of the office, having shipped seven men. Five of the men were accepted, examined and forwarded in the forenoon. Two of the applicants were accepted for the motor transport school at Baltimore, Md.; the remaining five were signed up for service in France and Germany. Out of the seven, four of the men held honorable discharges from the service. The regular army today needs this kind of material to make up the non-commissioned staff. The bill proposing the increase of pay of the enlisted personnel of the regular army to 50 per cent more than the present pay has been acted upon favorably and in the next few weeks the reconstruction will be brought about. This will pay a private forty-five dollars per month, together with board, clothing and medical attention.
