to enjoy it.

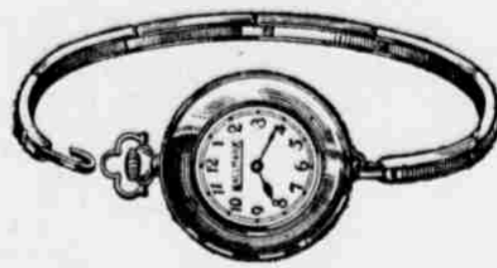
