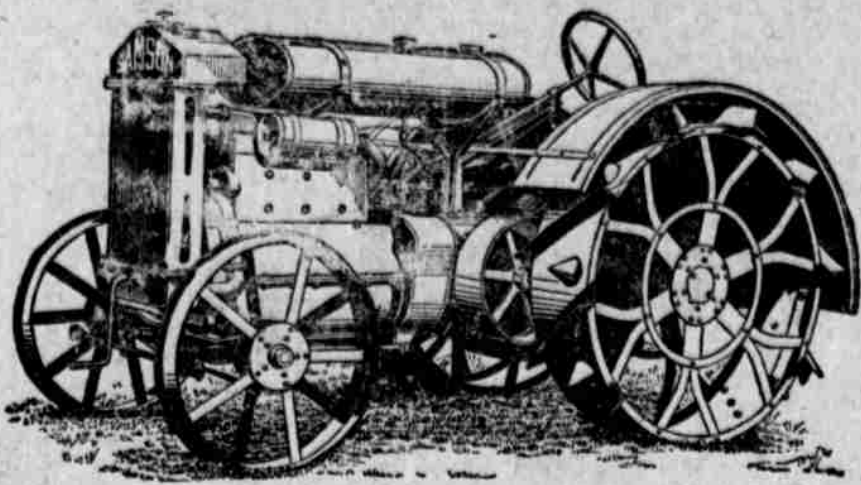

FUNERAL TODAY

Funeral services for Francis J. Fay were held from the Church of the Holy Rosary in this city at 9 o'clock this morning, the body arriving from Waterloo, Ia. Interment was in the Catholic cemetery.

Francis J. Fay was born August 1, 1890, at Alliance. His father died in 1898, and his mother two years later. He was educated in the Alliance public schools. February 21, 1917, he was married to Miss Clara Stewart, and to the union one child, a daughter, was born, the young wife dying June 17, 1919. Francis Fay died January 20, 1920, at Waterloo, Ia., of pneumonia contracted in the line of duty.

The deceased was a member of Alliance lodge, B. P. O. E., and of the Knights of Columbus.
