GRIEVANCE CARDS FOR CUSTOMERS

Retailers of Nebraska will shortly be in a position to call those customers who hold them responsible for a large part of the high cost of living. Mrs. C. G. Ryan, director of the state economy campaign, and fair price commissioner for Nebraska, is sending out quantities of cards upon which complaints may be written by customers. These will be distributed with the aid of the jobbers. All that a retailer need do is to hand a card to the customer and invite him to write down his grievance.

Mrs. Ryan believes the retailers will embrace the opportunity to put themselves right before their customers, and thus focus attention on the real cause. The cards are accompanied by this letter:
"You will receive with this letter a number of the consumers complaint cards.

"We send this package with the request that you assist in the distribution of the cards by having your salesmen put them in the hands of your customers.

"It is believed that retail dealers will welcome these cards and an opportunity to show their good faith and to convince customers they are co-operating with federal authorities to weed out profiteers.

"You realize that high costs are causing much discontent, that many consumers trace the trouble no further than their immediate handler of merchandise and hold him responsible for profiteering and other ills of which he may be, and probably is, entirely innocent.

"We believe the complaint card will focus attention upon legitimate complaints and check distrust, exaggeration and misstatements.
of "Your salesmen will be of serv-

ice if they put these cards in the hands of the trade with the suggestion that the retailers invite their customers' attention to them, thus showing a generous spirit of co-operation in efforts to reduce the high cost of living.
"Your help and that of your salesmen will be much appreciated."

BIG DECREASE SHOWN IN NATIONAL DEBT
