RAILROAD IMPROVEMENTS FOR YEAR ARE LAID OUT

The Burlington railroad has its work for this year well laid out, says The State Journal, which does not quote officials as giving Alliance any hope for big improvements this year. Most of it is track work, ballasting, placing new rails, etc. One of the big jobs to be finished soon is the bridge over the North Platte river near Bridgeport. That would have been farther along had it not been that forces and material employed on that work were withdrawn for a time while repair work on the main line north of Alliance was being made after the big floods of three weeks ago.

Three new coal chutes of modern steel construction, are being built this year, one at Red Cloud, one at Denver and one at Aurora. These have been badly needed for some time and would have been built long ago had not the war interfered with construction. The coal chute in use at Red Cloud is one of the oldest type. The chute at Denver burned some weeks ago.

A large amount of new steel is being laid and several miles of new yard tracks are to be added to the Lincoln yards during the summer. In addition a great deal of repair work is necessary where floods have made rebuilding necessary. Some of the big rush jobs of the year so far have been replacing grades and tracks washed away by unprecedented floods.

One big job completed this year was the relining with concrete of the Belmont tunnel. That was finished several weeks ago.
