E. Bliss, Frank Russell, I. Peters, and L. Powell. Much of this grain is a total loss. The hail streak was from two to three miles wide. Many farmers lost all of their windows on the west side of the house. Frank Russell was one of the heaviest losers on windows. It cost him \$20.00 for glass. Mr. Russell has been living on this section thirty years and this is the second hail storm he has wit-

nessed but of course this one was the hardest and more people suffered from it than ever before. The second hail storm, about forty-eight hours later was not near so bad in this neighborhood.
