MARY J. HAGEMAN

Mary J. Hawkins was born in Butler county, Ohio, March 24, 1847, and died in Alliance, Neb., Tuesday morning, July 27, 1920, aged 74 years, four months and three days. She was married to G. P. Hageman, Nov. 19, 1887 at Salina, Mercer Co., Ohio. To Mr. and Mrs. Hageman ten children were born. Two died in infancy. The eight surviving children are Mrs. P. G. Galkins, North Platte, Neb.; Mrs. C. H. Rokey, Alliance, C. O. Hageman, Broken Bow; A. E. Hageman, Carthage, Mo.; A. L. Hageman, Grand Island; S. R. Hageman, Kansas City; G. H. Hageman, Sheridan, Wyo., and Mrs. E. L. Routh, Alliance, Neb.

For nearly fifty-three years Mr. and Mrs. Hageman have been married. Forty-six years of this time was spent in Nebraska. On account of Mrs. Hageman's health they came to Alliance about three months ago and made their home with their daughter, Mrs. Rokey. The end came very peacefully on Tuesday morning after a paralytic stroke on Sunday morning. Early in life Mr. and Mrs. Hageman united with the Evangelical church and later which was many years ago they were baptized by Elder Louie Piper in the Nasama river at Brock, Neb., and affiliated with the Christian church. Sister Hageman has been a patient sufferer for months past but always

was happy to testify to her faith in Christ and the hope of the resurrection. She died as she had lived, a Christian.

Besides her husband and children she is survived by forty-three grandchildren and seven great grandchildren and many friends. The sympathy of all is extended to the aged husband who has been her devoted companion for over fifty years.
