OBITUARY.

Charlotte Temple Jeffers was born in Harrison county, Ohio, May 11 1833, and died September 29, 1920 at the home of her brother, Joseph Jeffers, in South Alliance, Neb., being aged eighty-seven years, four months and eighteen days.

She was married to Ira Ward October 9, 1851. Two daughters were born to this union, one of whom survives. She also has two brothers and one sister living to mourn her loss. Her husband, Ira Ward, enlisted in Company H of the Twenty-first Ohio regiment in 1861 and never returned from the war, dying in Andersonville prison in 1864. Mrs. Ward homesteaded in Hamilton county Neb., in an early day, later moving to Missouri. Two years ago, in failing health, her brother brought her to his home in South Alliance where she has been an invalid for more than a year.

Funeral services were held from the home at 3 p. m. September 30, conducted by Rev. A. J. Kearns, pastor of the Presbyterian church. The body was taken to the cemetery where interment will be held.

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AUDIENCE CONVINCED AT ELLISON RECITAL

Probably a number of people who attended the recital given last Friday by Glen Ellison and Miss Alta Hill at the Imperial theater were puzzled and disappointed when they discovered a phonograph cabinet occupying the center of the stage. They felt that they had been beguiled into going to hear a charming singer and a clever pianist and thought that they had been imposed upon.

They hardly were reassured when Mr. Ellison appeared on the stage and commenced to talk about "reproduction," "re-creation," and other like matter. It finally became apparent that the phonograph was at least to receive assistance from the singer but even then the initial outlook was not exactly bright.

Mr. Ellison explained that the purpose of the recital was to illustrate that Thomas A. Edison, after years of work, had achieved his ideal of perfect a musical instrument which would actually re-create music so perfectly that the re-creation would be indistinguishable from the original.

This was a broad claim but it was established before the afternoon was over, for Mr. Ellison actually stood beside the New Edison phonograph

and sang in unison with Mr. Edison's re-creation of his own voice. This would have proved little as his voice might easily have overbalanced the tone of the instrument—swallowed it up—so to speak; but Mr. Ellison did more—or, to be accurate, less. He paused from time to time, apparently at random and permitted his re-created voice to be heard alone. This gave an opportunity to compare one with the other and it is no more than just to state that there was no discernable difference in tone quality.

There must have been a slight difference in volume when Mr. Ellison stopped singing but it was not noticeable for the voice which came from the cabinet was round, luscious, with all of the vibrant, pulsating quality of that which came directly from Mr. Ellison's throat. It was only by watching the singer's lips that one could be sure when he sang and when he did not.

Miss Alta Hill offered similar comparisons with her instrument playing in direct comparison with the re-creation of her own performance.
