

LIBERTY BONDS UNDELIVERED DUE TO INCOMPLETE ADDRESSES

The War Department has just issued a list of "Unshipped Liberty Bonds." This contains an alphabetical list of the officers and enlisted men who subscribed to the total of 4,800 bonds of the 2nd, 3rd and 4th Liberty Loans and which bonds are still held by the War Department; as the Finance Office has been unable to deliver them either because of faulty address or because no request has been made to have them delivered. These bonds were subscribed for while the men were in the service and paid for by their allotting a portion of their pay each month.

The War Department will deliver these bonds to their proper owners at any point in the United States or its possessions provided the original subscriber sends instructions as to where he wants them shipped and gives sufficient data to identify himself as the original subscriber. In making requests for these bonds it is necessary that the following information be given:

- Full name of the subscriber.
- His rank, organization and station when the subscription was made.
- His army serial number (in case of enlisted men).
- Issue of bond subscribed for (i. e. whether 2nd, 3rd or 4th Liberty Loan).
- The amount of dollars subscribed for.
- Date upon which payment was

completed; if payment was made by allotment this would be the date of enlistment and date of discharge of the subscriber.

A statement as to whether he has received any refund at all on account of his subscription for Liberty Loan Bonds.

His present address.

The address to which he wants his bonds shipped ("General Delivery" is not considered a satisfactory address).

This information must be in the applicants own hand writing, and must be signed by him.

The applications should be addressed and sent to:

Bond Branch, Bond and Allotment Division, Finance Office, United States Army, Washington D. C.

The list may be seen at the local Army Recruiting station.

LEGISLATURE LOOKING FOR EXTRAVAGANCE

Senate Committee Checking Number of Employees Under Code Bill Against Old System.

Lincoln—The senate committee appointed to inquire if any duplication or extravagance exists in the administration of state affairs is going direct to the respective state officers to find out for itself.

The procedure is to call in a state officer—most of the constitutional officers have already appeared—and find out the number of employees in his department, the work they do and the salary they get.

In this connection, the committee will make a careful check on the number of employees under the code compared with the number under the old form of government, according to Chairman Perry Reed.

The differences, if any, will be judiciously weighed against such authorized group of employees.

The committee has its headquarters outside the capitol building and its meetings are secret sessions held behind closed doors.

Code officials and the heads of other departments will be heard at the earliest possible moment, and the committee will give anyone who has criticism an opportunity to present it.

Any matter bearing on the subject of the inquiry, according to Senator Reed, will be considered by the committee.

Suggest Motor Law Changes

The house committee on roads and bridges has submitted a bill calling for numerous changes in the present motor license law. As submitted, the bill repeals the provision requiring state highway bureau to reassign automobile owners their old license numbers. Requires county treasurer to furnish license blanks. Requires bureau to furnish two number plates to each owner, one of which shall be displayed on the front and one on the back of his machine. Authorizes the use of pasteboard cards by dealers for cars sold in transit, good for ten days only. Provides that 95 per cent of automobile license tax shall be retained by the county treasurer, for use on roads within the county, and the other five per cent remitted to the state.

Ask Treasurer for Statement.

State Treasurer Cropsey has been asked by the legislative reference bureau to furnish a statement of the suspended account caused by defaultations.

The treasurer says the suspended account in the Bartley defalcation was \$673,641.35. There has been paid into the treasury \$113,974.16, leaving a balance of \$559,667.19, but Mr. Cropsey says his office cannot find where \$50,353.05 was credited. The account is an ancient one, handled by the state treasurer years ago, and Mr. Cropsey is unable to make any explanation as to what became of the \$50,353.

New Voting By Mail Law.

To eliminate opportunities for fraud in the operation of Nebraska's voting by mail law, Speaker Anderson has introduced a bill which repeals the old statute and enacts one in its place containing ample safeguards against unlawful voting.

In the present voting by mail law, there is no provision for checking up votes cast by persons claiming residence in small cities, villages or rural territory to determine whether they are qualified voters or not.

Arrange Payment of Hall Claims.

Governor McKelvie has arranged with State Auditor George W. Marsh to pay half the \$760,000 state hall insurance losses incurred in 1920, the remainder to be held over until all state taxes are collected.

The payments will be prorated among the 3,000 claimants, each receiving 50 per cent.

To Check Deficiencies.

Personal liability of state officers, who are heads of departments, for deficiencies incurred within their respective jurisdictions may be imposed by the Nebraska legislators as a needed check upon some official activities.

At every legislative session, deficiencies are brought in running from a quarter of a million dollars up.

New State Veterinary Examiner.

Dr. George A. Young, of Syracuse, has been appointed a member of the state board of veterinary examiners by Governor McKelvie. His term will be for three years.

He succeeds J. C. Bowman, of Hebron. Other members of the board are Dr. S. W. Alford of Lincoln, and Dr. J. W. McEachran, of Geneva.

Will Hear Parole Cases.

About seventy-five parolable cases at the Nebraska penitentiary will be before the new state board of paroles at its initial session according to Chief State Probation Officer N. T. Harmon.

Most of the cases for early submission are on behalf of men who worked on state road camps during the summer and who have served their minimum term.

The parole officer has already notified the trial judge, the prosecuting attorney and the sheriff of the county from which each man was sent up.
