So far no bill has attracted quite so much attention in the house as the hail insurance bill. It had smooth sailing in the committee of the whole until the section providing a revolving fund of \$100,000 for working capital was reached. Then the oratory started and more than half a day was needed to decide the question. It was finally decided to not remove that section. The next question was zone rates. Some sections of the state think they are discriminated against. It seemed at first the bill would be killed by a night's rest but instead, it caused a reaction in its favor and it now appears to have a chance to pass.

The house refused to pass a bill requiring architects to be licensed. The main objection seemed to be that it would provide for another state examining board.

Fruits and Vegetables.

Potato prices advance 5c-15c per hundred pounds, at northern shipping points, reaching \$1.05-\$1.25; cat lot market active at Chicago, up 10c-15c at \$1.35-\$1.40. Round Whites up 1c-2c western New York stations, reaching \$1.25-\$1.30 sacked. New York 25c higher at \$1.50-\$1.65 bulk. Car lot shipments week ended March 8, potatoes, 3,479 cars.

Hay.

Receipts generally light. Majority of markets reporting easier tendency. Omaha market strong and quoting alfalfa and prairie about \$1 higher because of insufficient receipts. Southern markets dull and largely in buyers' favor with sales at widely varying prices. Best grade in good demand. Good inquiry for southwest prairie and straw, especially dry straw in Chicago. Receipts in Cincinnati large with light shipping demand. Quoted: No. 1 timothy, \$20 Minneapolis; \$26.50 Memphis; \$22 Cincinnati; \$27.50 Chicago. No. 2 timothy; \$17.50 Minneapolis; \$21 Memphis; \$20 Cincinnati. No. 1 clover, mixed; \$16.50 Minneapolis; \$20.50 Cincinnati. No. 1 prairie; \$16 Minneapolis; \$15 Kansas City. No. 1 alfalfa; \$21 Minneapolis; \$27 Memphis; \$19 Omaha; \$23 Kansas City. No. 2 alfalfa; \$17 Minneapolis; \$20 Memphis; \$10 Omaha.

Feed.

Feed prices unchanged to lower. Middlings strong, bran lower. Corn feeds unchanged. Cotton seed meal easier; linseed meal in fairly good demand. Stocks generally larger than normal and increasing rather than decreasing because of ample receipts and continued light demand. Alfalfa meal weak and quoted lower. Jobbers in Chicago market who purchased heavily on the low market are now offering wheat feeds 50c-\$1.50 under mill prices. Mill prices firm because of light production and few offerings. Quoted bran \$26.50 Chicago; \$33 Boston; middlings \$26 Chicago; \$32 Boston; 36 per cent cotton seed meal, \$25. Minneapolis; linseed meal \$40.50 Minneapolis; \$51 Buffalo. No. 1 alfalfa meal \$19 Omaha and Kansas City. Gluten feeds: \$37 Chicago. White hominy feed, \$23 St. Louis; \$32 Boston. Beet pulp, \$32 f.o.b. New York.

Dairy Products.

Tendency has been downward in butter markets during the week although there was a temporary recovery at New York on the 5th which, however, has not been maintained. Prices on the 9th average full 4 1/2c under those of a week ago and markets are now weak. Usual low trading which accompanies a declining market is taking place and little but regular business is materializing supply exceeds present demand and dealers shading prices in some instances. Closing prices 92 score: New York 50c; Philadelphia, 51c; Boston 50c; Chicago 48c.

Live Stock and Meats.

With the exception of hogs Chicago live stock prices showed slight declines the past week. Hogs advanced 10c-50c per 100 pounds. Best beef and butcher cattle averaged about 25c lower while veal calves declined \$1. Feeder steers up 25c. Fat lambs 10c-25c; feeding lambs unchanged. Yearlings down 25c and fat ewes 50c per 100 lbs. March 9 Chicago prices: Hogs, bulk of sales \$10-\$11.25; medium and good beef steers \$8.40-\$10.25; butcher cows and heifers \$5-\$9.75; feeder steers \$7.50-\$9.50; light and medium weight veal calves \$9-\$12.25; fat lambs \$8.50-\$11; feeding lambs \$7.50-\$9; yearlings \$6.75-\$9.25; fat ewes \$4.75-\$6.50. Eastern wholesale fresh meat

prices were irregular with the trend downward. Lambs declined \$1-\$2; mutton \$1 per 100 lbs; pork loins steady at \$1 lower; veal ranged from \$1 lower at some markets to \$1 higher at others. Beef steady to \$1 higher. March 9 prices on good grade meats: Beef \$16.50-\$17.50; veal, \$20-\$22; lambs \$18-\$20; mutton \$11-\$15; light pork loins \$21-\$22; heavy loins \$16-\$20.

Grain.

The political situation abroad and a good export demand resulted in higher grain prices the first half of week but prices eased off later on liquidation of long holdings, favorable crop reports and slower milling and export demand. On the 9th bearish construction of government wheat report caused decline of about 3 cents in March wheat but the loss was more than recovered by short coverings and removal of hedgers' gains wheat for export. Export corn demand slower but domestic eastern shipping demand improved. Country offerings and receipts light.
