Three months from the time that the present legislature adjourns a new law that will bring all state banks in Nebraska under the guaranty fund will go into effect. Two years ago the law was amended so as to require a twoyear period of probation, but according to this new one all not now under the law must come in within thirty

This law amends rections 14, 16 and 16 of the Ebanking law. In the firs named section the part exempting rom the making of reports bank hat have not been in business for tw years is struck out, and all new bank are required to file the report called

for in section 15 of the existing law Section 16 is amended so as to give the state banking department the power to deny an application for a nev harter if it is not convinced that the public necessity, convenience and ad antage will be promoted by permit ing such proposed bank to engage it

Section 46 is amended to read a "Any bank organized sub equent to the date when this article akes effect shall pay into the deposi ors' guarantee fund an amount equa o 4 per cent of the amount of the capital stock, when such bank open

for business, which amount shall con titute a credit fund, subject to ad justment on the basis of said bank iverage daily deposits, as shown b he first two semi-annual statement required by section 45 of this article The department of trade and com merce is authorized and empowered to make such an adjustment of the rate of assessment to be paid by any bank which engages in the banking busines ubsequent to the time when this arti le takes effect, as shall require such bank to contribute to the depositors guarantee fund, a just and equitable sum, and the department of trade and commerce shall adjust assessments of such bank so that the first two assess ments, together with the credit of ar amount equal to 4 per cent of the cap ital stock paid in by said bank when i begins business shall at least equal per cent of the average daily deposit of said bank as shown by the first two semi-annual statements required by section 45 of this article. Such pay ment shall not be required of nev banks formed by the reorganization of consolidation of banks which have prior thereto, complied with the law with reference to the payment of as-

"When any bank hereafter organ "When any bank hereafter organized shall acquire the business and resources of any national banking association, such bank shall pay into the lepositors' guarantee fund not less than 1 per cent of said national banking association's average daily depos its as shown by the report of the comptroller of the currency for the preceding year. On the first day of July and January of each year the department shall levy on all banks ther engaged in banking under this article which have completed their initial payments of not less than 1 per cent of their average daily deposits as prorided in this section, one-twentieth of per cent of the average daily deposits as shown by this statement requir ed to be made and filed next preced ing such assessments.

Every corporation to which a char ter has been granted since April 4 1919, to conduct the banking business shall pay into the guarantee fund ar amount equal to 4 per cent of it capital stock within thirty days after the taking effect of this act and thereafter shall be subject to assessment in the same manner as banks hereafter established."


