The present price of hides is so low that some farmers are neglecting to "skin" animals. It is possible to cure hides so they may be stored several months, according to a United States department of agriculture farmers' bulletin called "Country Hides and Skins—Skinning, Curing and Marketing." The bulletin gives suggestions on handling hides, taking them off, salting and curing them, and shipping and marketing. Copies may be obtained through agents or by writing to the College of Agriculture at Lincoln. The college also has a circular on tanning hides, which gives methods of making robes, rugs and leather.
