ORDINANCE NO. 318

AN ORDINANCE LEVYING A TAX FOR THE YEAR 1921 AND FOR THE PURPOSE OF CREATING FUNDS FOR THE FISCAL YEAR ENDING ON THE SECOND MONDAY IN AUGUST, 1922, FOR THE PAYMENT OF THE GENERAL AND INCIDENTAL EXPENSES OF THE CITY OF ALLIANCE, NEBRASKA, FOR THE SUPPORT, MAINTENANCE AND REPAIR OF THE SEWER SYSTEM, PUBLIC LIBRARY AND CITY PARK OF SAID CITY, FOR THE SUPPORT AND MAINTENANCE OF THE FIRE DEPARTMENT AND POLICE DEPARTMENT OF SAID CITY, AND FOR PAYING THE INTEREST ON AND A PART OF THE PRINCIPAL OF THE SEWER EXTENSION BONDS, CITY HALL AND CITY PARK REFUNDING BONDS, 1919 FUNDING BONDS, DRAINAGE BONDS, 1919 PAVING INTERSECTION BONDS, 1920 DRAINAGE EXTENSION BONDS, AND 1920 PAVING INTERSECTION BONDS, OF THE CITY OF ALLIANCE, NEBRASKA.

BE IT ORDAINED, by the Mayor and Council of the City of Alliance, Nebraska:

Section 1. That there is hereby levied for the year 1921 and for the purpose of creating funds for the fiscal year ending on the second Monday in August, 1922, a tax upon each dollar of the actual value of all real estate and personal property within the corporate limits of the City of Alliance, Nebraska, taxable according to the laws of the State of Nebraska for the various purposes and in the various numbers of mills or parts of mills hereinafter set out: (a) For the payment of the general and incidental expenses of said city (three (3) mills. (b) For the purpose of supporting, maintaining and repairing the sewer system of said city, eight-tenths (.8) mill. (c) For the purpose of supporting, maintaining and repairing the city library of said city eight-tenths (.8) mill. (d) For the purpose of paying the salaries of the members of the Board of Park Commissioners, providing funds for amusements, laying out, improving and beautifying the parks and public grounds and paying the salaries and wages of employees of the Board of Park Commissioners of said city, four-tenths (.4) mill. (e) For the purpose of supporting, maintaining and paying the Police Department of said city one (1) mill. (f) For the purpose of supporting, maintaining and paying the Fire Department of said city, eight-tenths (.8) mill. (g) For the purpose of paying the interest upon and a part of the principal of the sewer bonds of said city, one and twenty-five one-hundredths (1.25) mills. (h) For the purpose of paying the interest upon and a part of the principal of the sewer extension bonds

of said city, fifteen one-hundredths (.15) mill. (i) For the purpose of paying the interest upon and a part of the principal of the city hall and city park refunding bonds of said city, twenty-five one-hundredths (.25) mills. (j) For the purpose of paying the interest upon and a part of the principal of the 1919 funding bonds of said city, one (1) mill. (k) For the purpose of paying the interest upon and a part of the principal of the drainage bonds of said city, two and five one-hundredths (2.05) mills. (l) For the purpose of paying the interest upon and a part of the principal of the 1919 paving intersection bonds of said city five-tenths (.5) mill. (m) For the purpose of paying the interest upon and a part of the principal of the 1920 drainage extension bonds of said city twenty-five one-hundredths (.25) mill. (n) For the purpose of paying the interest upon and a part of the principal of the 1920 paving intersection bonds of said city, six-tenths (.6) mill. Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect and be in full force from and after its passage, publication and approval, according to law.

Alliance Woman Makes Room for Soldier's Wife

The appeal published in Tuesday's Herald from a Chadron woman, whose ex-soldier husband is now in St. Joseph's hospital, for a place where she and her four-months-old baby could find a home and an opportunity to earn their keep during the time the husband and father is confined to the hospital, found a ready response. One Alliance woman, who hasn't forgotten the war and the sacrifices made by soldiers, has opened her home and her heart, and the mother and babe will have a place to live an eat and be able to see the soldier in the hospital.

The young mother was willing to make almost any sacrifice to be near her husband. She tried desperately hard to find work in Alliance, but was unsuccessful. No one wanted to employ for housework a woman who had a young baby to care for, and the mother had been trained in nothing else. As a last resort, she offered to leave her baby with relatives at Chadron, and work here simply for money enough to pay for the care of the child.

Herald readers will be pleased to know that this soldier's wife will not be required to make this sacrifice, and that she has found a pleasant home and sympathetic companionship, and that she may keep her baby with her. The women who made the offer is the sort who will make the young mother's stay in Alliance as pleasant as possible. Red Cross officials in

Chadron and Alliance, who have been trying to find a home for the two during the time the husband will be in the hospital, are rejoicing with her in the fact that everything has turned out happily for her.
