EXPLAINS THE QUARANTINE REGULATIONS

CITY MANAGER KEMMISH COM-PILES LATE RULES.

Makes It Plain that Where Patients Are Confined in Pest House the City Doesn't Pay Bills.

City Manager Kemmish has compiled a summary of the rules of the state ed a summary of the rules of the state board of health applying to communicable diseases, as well as information concerning reports of such diseases, quarantine regulations, cases requiring fumigation and the use of the pest house. His statement has been submitted to Dr. I. H. Dillon, chief of the state bureau of health, and approved. ing on the part of not only the public, but some of the physicians, concerning some of these matters, and Mr. Kem-mish has taken care to include all of the important regulations. The compilation is right up-to-the-minute, some of the regulations quoted having not yet been distributed to physicians over the state. The new regulations are now being printed and will not be available for general distribution for two weeks.

The chief effect of these regulations will be the saving of a considerable expense to the city in connection with the operation of the pest house. In the past patients have been sent to the pest house on the order of their physicians, and in practically all of these cases the city has paid the bill. This practice has been used to such an extent that a physician or two has complained because the pest house was not fitted with all the conveniences of home. In a recent case, the city paid for the installation of a telephone, electric lights, city employes carried water to the building and furnished coal, and there was some complaint because the grocery bill was not paid.

Under the new order of things, patients may use the pest house in the event they do not wish to have their homes quarantined, but it will be entirely at their own expense. The city is responsible only for the cost of enforcing quarantine, for placarding and for fumigation, but is not responsible for time lost or for the support of patients under quarantine. Should the hoard of health of Alliance see fit to board of health of Alliance see fit to isolate a patient in the pest house, it may do so by special order, and in such cases, and such cases only, will the city bear the expense. Notice should be taken that the head of the family is primarily responsible in seeing that communicable diseases are reported to the secretary of the board of health. If they fail to do so they are subject to the following fine. Whenever a doctor is called in, however, he then becomes responsible. ALLIANCE MAN PASSED AWAY WALKOUT WILL NOT TIE UP ALL OF THE TRAINS.

Inquest Held Monday Afternoon to Officals Hold Conference to Consider What Will Be Done If an Emergency Arises.

Adolph W. Brost, thirty-eight years and three months of age, an Alliance plasterer, died at St. Joseph's hospital Saturday morning during an operation for removal of tonsils, which was performed by Drs. G. J. Hand and M. J. Baskin. According to the reports nade to County Attorney Basye, Mr. Bost died suddenly, about ten minutes after Dr. Baskin had started administering the anaesthetic, and when the operating department, a machine designed to move mail, express and to give limited passenger service as soon as possible. Dr. Baskin had started administering the anaesthetic, and when the operation was about half completed. The right tonsil had been removed by Dr. Hand, when the patient ceased to breathe.

The cause of death has not been definitely established. The anaesthetics used were first ether and then chloroform, when the ether did not produce satisfactory results. In certain cases death has resulted from use of anaesthetics. Sister Constantia of the hospital was present during the operation.
