**"Hellow" Girl Gets Medal**

OMAHA—Mrs. Mildred Lothrop of Homer, Neb., has been awarded the Theodore Vall gold medal and \$1,000 by the Bell Telephone company for her heroic action on the night of May 31, 1920, by remaining at her post as a telephone operator and warning inhabitants of the Omaha creek valley of impending danger from cloudburst.

Frank H. Forest, manager of the Northwest Bell telephone company at Dakota City has received the second highest award, a gold medal and \$500 cash for heroic work during the danger from cloudburst. He made his way to Homer, wading through water some of the distance and established communication with Sioux City. In this manner he was able to summon help for the flood victims.

He did not have long to wait. A gang of Hallowe'en celebrants swooped down on the buggy, and quietly pulled it for blocks down the street, until they came to the O street viaduct.

This they crossed and finally pulled the buggy into a field on the banks of Salt creek, where they stopped.

**Says Plenty of Jobs**

LINCOLN—There were more jobs than men who would work in Nebraska in October, according to a report issued yesterday by Clarence C. Becker, examiner in charge of the federal and state employment bureau. His figures show that 713 jobs went begging for men to accept them during the month.

"Many men made our office a loafing place and refused jobs that they could have had wages from 35 cents to 50 cents an hour, the objection being that the work was too dirty, too hard or did not last long enough."

Becker told of Gage county farmers who advertised for two or three weeks for men to schuck corn and declared that Nebraska farmers could use 2,000 corn shuckers at the present time.

**Capture "Magic Glasses" Salesman**

FREMONT—Sheriff Bill Condit has come to the end of a three weeks' hunt for Phil E. Monheit, alias Dr. Paul E. Martell, the man who sold the miracle eyeglasses to a Hooper woman for \$3,000, with the report that the alleged swindler has been captured in Toledo, Ohio. The county official left Monday afternoon to bring the man back to this country with word that Monheit, believed to be the man's true name, waives extradition.

The arrest followed a clue received from an envelope found in Denver, Colo., addressed to him under the

name of Monheit from Toledo. Sheriff Condit made a trip to Denver and located the man who endorsed the \$1,000 check paid to the faker by Mrs. Pauline Schwab, 72, his victim of the radium glasses scheme.

Constant grilling forced the man to confess that Monheit had registered at the William Penn hotel. The endorser of the check, one William Lander, supplied the missing link, when he showed a check paid to Monheit by himself, as change from a bill of merchandise he sold the alleged swindler. This clinched the identity of the smooth-tongued eye specialist and Condit got in touch with the Toledo officials.

A full description soon brought the man into the police station.

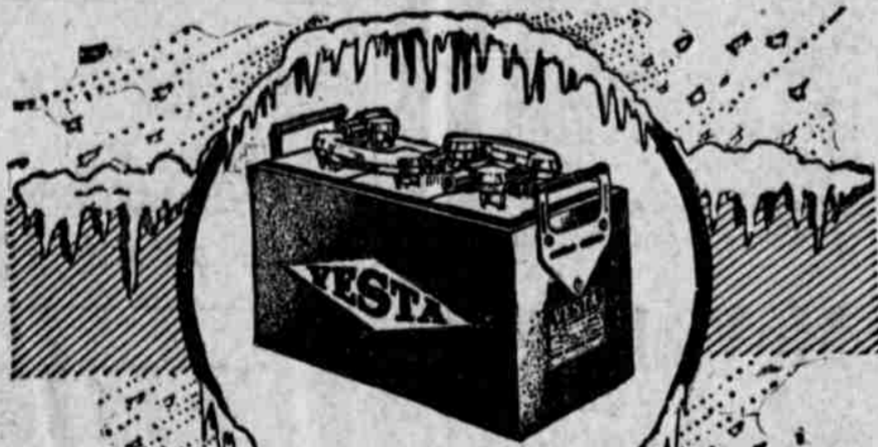
