Says Tom Gray Has Plied Trade in Hemingford

Tom Gray, captured by Alliance officers last week in the act of manufacturing moonshine hooch, was well known in Hemingford and had worked up a fair trade in that vicinity, according to the Hemingford Ledger, which publishes a story that is a queer mixture of rumors, guesses and fact. The Ledger thinks Tom will be missed. It says:

"Tom Gray was a partner of Earl Anderson of Alliance who was murdered last winter by Mrs. McElhane. It has been known for over two years that Gray was making liquor and peddling it in Alliance and Hemingford and surrounding territory. Officers have been watching his movements for some time but have been unable to secure any evidence that would warrant an arrest.

"Last July, while the carnival was in Hemingford, Gray had booze in his possession here and officers were after him. One night the officers chased him for some distance. They searched his car, but he was too fast for them. He seized the bottle and as the officers made a grab for him, he dodged around the car and broke the bottle over one of the tent stakes of the cabaret show. With the destruction of the evidence there was no reason for

holding Gray so the chase was abandoned.

"It was reported that there were several gallons of Canadian whisky in the lot of finished product. From all appearances Gray has been very open in his dealings and several fellows in Hemingford have said it was no difficulty to get the moonshine from him in Alliance, and that he never asked any questions as to who might be the person wanting the booze. However, there is always a lot of talk of this kind during such a case, that can not be relied upon and cannot be traced to its source. Several about here, however, seem to be interested in the question of whether the capture of Gray and his still will make any difference in the amount of booze that can be obtained on the quiet."

Grazing Land In Wyoming Opened to Ex-Service Men

By executive order of October 28, 1921, 3,692 acres of Wyoming land, all surveyed, were excluded from the Bridger National Forest, because of the low value thereof for forest purposes. Three thousand two hundred and ninety-two acres of these lands in Evanston and Lincoln counties, in Evanston Land district, are open to homestead and desert-land entry for sixty-three days beginning December 30, 1921, by ex-service men of the world war. Filings may be presented within the twenty-day period prior to that date, or from December 10 to December 29, 1921, inclusive. On and

after March 3, 1922, any of these lands that remain unentered will be subject to general disposition, that is, to appropriation under any applicable land law by the general public. It is reported that the restored areas have practically no agricultural value, but are principally valuable for grazing purposes. The preference granted ex-service men in this restoration is subject to prior valid settlement rights and equitable claims.
