Supt. W. R. Pate **Told Lions Club of** School Problems

Superintendent W. R. Pate of the Alliance schools was the principal speaker at the Thursday dinner of the Lions club. The speaker told the Lions omething of their own school system. He came here in 1910 and the school census the following year showed 1,111 attended the pub ic schools. The growth steady and consistent since that time, the 1921 census showing 1.573 students in Alliance, of whom 1,310 attended the public schools. The present high school building to seat 160 pupils. The enrollment for the 1910-11 term was 127 pupils. At present there are 262 pupils in the high school, with inevitable crowding. Teachers in the grades below the high school teach an average of 37 pupils, and in the high school, 28 pupils. The Alliance high school is fully accredited and its graduates are accepted without examination by all schools in the north central association. Interesting figures on the rising cost of education the state and district per pupil were given. The average cost over the state on enrollment has risen over the state on enrollment has risen from 26,11 per pupil in 1911-12 to 80.02 in 1920-21, and in Alliance from \$30.13 to \$56,80. Based on average daily attendance, the average from over the state has from \$26.11 per pupil in 1911-12 to \$80.02 in 1920-21, and in Alliance from \$40.90 to only \$74.20. Mr. Pate spoke of the qualifications of teachers and the necessity for mainof teachers and the necessity for maintaining the present salary schedule. Alliance salaries are fair, he said. He declared that the public school system is the salvation of a republic. He gave some figures showing that although education cost the United States \$763,-000,000 a year, this sum was less than s expended yearly for cigarettes, for which 800,000,000 are expended annually; a billion dollars is spent for can-dy and \$2,666,000,000 for war, over four times the amount spent for eduestion. Upon request by Lion W. R. Harper, Mr. Pate explained how the expenses for high school athletics were paid. "Athletics are self-supporting," said the speaker. The money is taken in as receipts from the games, and an accurate account kept. Parties inter-ested can examine the records for the past ten years, if they so desire. Only one instance occurred when assistance has been given. This was a contribution of \$150 by the school board during the past year. Every other dollar has been earned by the boys and girls themselves.
