Section 1 .- The officers of this league shall be composed of president, vice-president, secretary-treasurer, and the board of directors.

Section 3 .- The vice-president shall act in the same capacity as the president in his absence.

Article V-Games.

Section 1.—A schedule of games shall be adopted before the beginning of the playing season, any changes must be made by the board of direc-

Section 2 .- All games shall be played Sunday afternoons as per schedule, 46-tf beginning at 2:30 p. m. Umpire shall grant an extension of thirty minutes, If not ready to play at that time of-fending team shall forfeit the game. Section 3.-If both the home and visiting team are on the grounds ready to play and unfavorable weather should prevent the game, neither side

shall forfeit and the game shall be Section 4.—The captain of the home team shall be the judge of the fitness of the ground to play on, but if after the game is started the umpire should stop it on account of rain, the Umpire-in-Chief shall be the judge as to

Article VI-Funds.

Section 1 .- Each club shall deposit the sum of ten (10.00) dollars not later than April 29, 1922, as a guarantee of good faith. This money is to remain intact until the end of the season and deposited in such bank as the league may direct. The money to be returned at the end of the season pro-vided each team has lived up to the rules of this league.

Section 2.-All surplus moneys to be divided equally among the teams at the end of the season.

Section 5.-The expense of this league shall be met by assessing each club as often as the board of directors finds it necessary. Section 4.—No admission will be

charged at any league game. A col-lection may be taken up by "passing the hat," the money to be given to the home club.

Article VII-Umpires.
