ORDINANCE No. 327.

AN ORDINANCE CREATING AND DEFINING THE BOUNDARIES OF SEWER DISTRICT NUMBER THIRTY-NINE IN THE CITY OF ALLIANCE, NEBRASKA, AND REPEALING ORDINANCE NUMBER THREE HUNDRED AND TWENTY-SIX OF SAID CITY, AND ALL OTHER ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT THEREWITH. BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ALLIANCE, NEBRASKA; Section 1. That Sewer District No. 39 is hereby created in the City of Alliance, Nebraska.

Section 2. That Sewer District No. 39 shall include all real estate in Blocks H and E in Nebraska Addition to the City of Alliance, Nebraska; Lots Five, (5) and Six, (6) Block 170, (2) Amended Forest Sub-Division to Duncan's North Side Residence Tracts, an Addition to said City, and Lots Seven, (7), and Eight, Block One, (1), Amended Forest Sub-Division to Duncan's North Side Residence Tracts, an Addition to said City, together with the intervening streets and alleys.

Section 3. That Ordinance No. 326 of the City of Alliance, Nebraska, entitled, An Ordinance creating and defining the boundaries of Sewer District Number Thirty-Nine in the City of Alliance, Nebraska, and repealing Ordinance Number 311, and repealing Ordinance Number 317 of said City, and all other ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict therewith, and all other ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith be, and they hereby are repealed.

Section 4. That this ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage, approval and publication according to law. Passed and approved this 25th day of May, 1922.

Spanish War Vets' State Encampment June 12, 13 and 14

Unique, is the word for the fifteenth Annual Encampment, Department of Nebraska, United Spanish War Veterans, which is to convene at Hastings, Nebraska on June 12th, 13th, and 14th. For this encampment will be a tent encampment held in the Beautiful Prospect Park of that city.

It has been a great many years since such an open air encampment of any Nebraska organization of Veterans of any war has been held.

Twenty-four eventful years have rolled by since these Veterans of the Spanish American War marched away at their country's call. Since that day when Admiral Levey sounded the clarion call to arms by sending to the bottom of Manila Bay, Spain's proud Asiatic Fleet, the United States has taken part in another World War. And while the services of the younger brothers and many sons and daughters of the Spanish War Veterans have not overshadowed the remembrance of the sacrificial days of these boys of 1898, their comrades have not forgotten and from year to year they gather to talk over and keep bright these days of 1898 and 1899.

Nebraska sent three regiments of infantry and one troop of Cavalry besides a large number of volunteers in other state and National Organizations. Today there are living in the State between 3,500 and 4,000 of these Veterans and they are among the State's most honored and esteemed citizens. Many of them have risen to high ranks in the political as well as the business and professional world.

The encampment will be laid out in military lines and the main street will be known as Stotzenberg Avenue after the honored Colonel Stotzenberg of the First Nebraska, who gave his life as he led his regiment into battle in the Philippine Islands. The tents will all be ten by twelve with wall and will be provided with four cots and chairs and tent accommodations, and will be rented to the Veterans and their families at approximately eighty five cents per person per day. The local Camp, at Hastings has all the arrangements in charge and they promise a splendid kitchen and mess arrangements at very reasonable rates so that the cost will be much less than hotel rates.

The program will include an address by National Commander in Chief, Carlstrom of Illinois and National Patriotic Instructor Roy V. Hoffman of Oklahoma City. It is expected that several hundred veterans will be in attendance and many of them will drive in their autos bringing their families for the outing.

June 14th, is the National Holiday known as "Flag Day," and the veterans will give a "Flag Day" parade that afternoon in which all patriotic societies will be invited to participate. All Veterans, Soldiers, Sailors and Marines who honorably served in the forces of the United States at any time from April 21st, 1898 to July 4th, 1902 are invited to attend this encampment regardless of whether or not they are members of the order of United Spanish War Veterans.

The Chamber of Commerce of Hastings is co-operating with the veterans to make this the very largest encampment in the history of the United Spanish War Veterans of Nebraska and those who hope to attend will do well to write Frank H. Beels, Secretary of the Chamber of Commerce and Chairman of the Department Tent Committee at Hastings, Nebraska, because it is expected that the tent capacity will be early re-vised.

JUST AS GOOD

(Editor and Publisher)

The Association of National Advertisers at its recent meeting in Chicago laid stress on the fact that unfair non-advertised competition is lowering sales returns on advertised products and has appealed for newspaper support in a campaign that will create greater confidence in advertised products.

The A. N. A. members claim that non-advertisers are offering various inducements to have their merchandise pushed and that under this kind of competition uniform quality is of secondary consideration, with the result that the greatest argument in favor of advertising is removed.

Superior quality is naturally the basic principle behind advertising of national products and if this ceases to be a factor, then the entire foundation upon which modern advertising success is built crumbles.

The old merchandising phrase, "You can teach a parrot to say 'Just as good,' but he doesn't know what he is talking about," is just as true today as it was twenty-five years ago.

There can be no denying that the readjustment of prices from war-time levels has again brought the "just as good" expression to the fore. Neither can it be denied that the same condition is working a positive injury to advertising. Demand for a labeled product is the tangible return from money expended for advertising; substitution under the dishonest phrase "just as good" is a direct repudiation of advertising as an asset to business, which measures value with dollars and cents.

The appeal of the A. N. A. to the publishers of the country deserves more than passing notice. Many trade names that stood for quality a few years ago were almost forgotten, while the more serious business of war was being attended to; the guardians of those good names are again trying to win public favor by advertising and they deserve support of the newspapers in the re-establishment of public confidence in advertised quality over a clerk's "just as good."

American Legion Notes

"FACTS—NOT OPINIONS"

The flag will be flown at half-staff on July 9 wherever an American Legion clubhouse is located in memory of Colonel F. W. Galbraith, Jr., who died on this date one year ago while serving as national commander of the legion. "He died in active service," says Lemuel Bailey, national adjutant of the legion, "and he was cut off in the midst of literally untiring efforts for the nation and the legion."

Personal greetings from Commander Hanford MacNider of the American Legion are being carried to the British legion in its annual conference in London by H. Nelson Jackson of Vermont, national vice-commander of the American Legion. Mr. Jackson sailed for London on May 20. He is official American leg. on representative at the conference of the British legion, recently organized after the model of the American Legion.

The message of Commander MacNider reads in part: "No generation of our nations have been so closely bound together. Through the coming years it must be our mutual duty to so strengthen and cement these ties that from this great understanding may come peace for all the world."

The million dollar relief fund appropriated by the New York legislature, modeled after similar legislation in Nebraska which was promoted by the American legion, is now available to ex-service men. The veterans must have their claims passed on by their local posts before they are paid. Disabled men, under this law, will receive from \$22 to \$33.

The Art Grey memorial was dedicated at 1:10 p. m., April 22. It is the new legion hall erected at a cost of \$2,300. For the past two years the members of the local post have answered roll call on the streets. The night of the dedication they all turned out and with the rest of the citizens had a big beer barbecue. The town is located twenty-six miles from a railroad, but has 25 of the resident ex-soldiers enrolled. And there is not a veteran in the whole county out of work.

Hanford MacNider, national commander of the American Legion, recently sent a circular letter to the leading educators of the country asking their opinion of the legion. Most of them were quick to reply. Here is what the Legion Weekly says about the head of Nebraska's university: "I am heartily in accord with everything you say about the opportunities of the legion for usefulness. I believe it is potentially if not actually, the strongest force in the country for the preservation of those institutions and keeping alive that spirit of Americanism which has made us the greatest nation in the world. I shall be greatly pleased to send out a circular to all graduates and former students eligible to the legion urging them to join."

Perhaps we shouldn't quote all of the letter from Dr. Avery. It's hardly fair. You see, Dr. Avery happens to be a buddy, a member of the Lincoln Neb. post, which is only five blocks away from the campus. Dr. Avery is one of the men who believes implicitly in the legion, and he also is the kind of a man who works for what he believes in.

An American Legion pilgrimage to France, Belgium and England is planned for this summer, and the steamer President Roosevelt, with a legion skipper and an all-legion crew, has been tentatively engaged for the trip. It is planned to start the trip from New York on July 25, with the party returning to the United States on September 3. Only members of the leg. on will make up the passenger list of 225.

A real fight is on among American Legion posts in Nebraska for third place in membership, first and second places going to the larger cities of Omaha and Lincoln. North Platte recently nosed into the lead and is working night and day to hold its advantage. Grand Island had the honor in 1920 and 1921, and Commander Lawrence Treat is leading a desperate charge of Commander C. A. Selby's post on. The count now stands at 301 to 277. Nebraska City, Norfolk and Beatrice posts are also in the race and coming fast.

The dirt track automobile race at North Platte on the fourth of July, promoted by the American Legion, promise to be the biggest sporting event of the day in Nebraska. Nine members of the National American Auto-

mobile association have sent in their entries. All are well known drivers and several took part in the recent Indianapolis world's championship races. The twenty mile race has a purse of \$4,000 and the five mile race of \$1,000. The list of cars and their drivers are as follows:

sale of daisies and withholds its support from the poppy campaign is explained in this statement issued Friday by Adjutant Frank B. O'Connell of the legion in Nebraska:

"State headquarters of the Nebraska American leg. on has received several inquiries asking if the legion endorses the sale of poppies or is interested in such sale, as suggested in the newspapers recently. "Most emphatically we are not. Our national convention last year adopted the daisy as the memorial flower of the world war. Certain organizations purporting to represent French children exploited our posts and the general public to such an extent that we threw the whole outfit over the transom and adopted an American flower. Even this year, after we had decided to use the daisy, high-salaried salesmen hounded us for weeks trying to unload their poppies.

"The Legion buys the daisies for a little over one cent each and sells them for a dime. Every bit of this profit goes to the care of disabled and decorating the graves of American dead. Our 100,000 of these daisies will be worn on Memorial day in Nebraska alone. They are being used by the thousands in the decorating of our graves here in the state and also in France. Our posts send donations direct to our Paris post and they take care of the graves over there. "For three years now the Legion has decorated every American grave in France and every world war veteran's grave in Nebraska, besides hundreds of those of soldiers of other wars who are buried at those places where there is no post of the G. A. R. or Spanish War veterans."
