TWO MEN ARRESTED LAST EVENING BY THE POLICE

DEATHS AND FUNERALS

William Steggs was born near Pleasantville, Ia., April 3, 1850. When a child he came to Missouri with his parents, where they both died. William grew into manhood in Harrison county, Missouri. He was married to Mary Ellen Stanley of Eagleville, Mo., April 9, 1874. Four children were born of whom two are living: Mrs. Leona Marcum of Alliance, and Rufus B. Steggs of Wauwata, Neb. Mary Ellen Steggs died in 1880 and was buried in Ridgway, Mo.

In the year 1886, he was married to his present wife, then Zarada A. Green, and four children were born, three boys and one girl. Those living today are: J. E. Steggs of Alliance, Clarence, of Genoa, Col., and Joseph of near Henry, Neb.

William Steggs was converted and baptized in 1885, and affiliated with the Baptist church. He later transferred his membership to the church at Alliance, in which he remained a faithful member until death.

He was fully prepared to meet his God, and the salvation of his children was constantly in his mind during the latter months of his illness. His death was caused by liver trouble of long standing. He leaves a host of friends and several grandchildren to mourn his departure. He died with most of his relatives about him.

A short service was held at the home by Rev. B. J. Minort, assisted by Rev. S. J. Epler of the Christian church. The main funeral service was held at the Baptist church, Rev. B. J. Minort officiating, with the assistance of Rev. Mr. Epler. Burial was made in Greenwood cemetery.

Engineers A. M. Gaddis and Wm. F. Hart Are Guests of Lions Club

A. M. Gaddis, division engineer of the state highway department, and William F. Hart, United States engineer, were guests of the Lions club at its regular Thursday evening luncheon. They were in Alliance over night, in readiness for the survey of the "missing link" of the Potash highway Friday.

Engineer Gaddis explained the road situation in western Nebraska. He realized that everyone was vitally interested in the subject, and while he felt that not as much had been done, perhaps, as should have been, nevertheless present activities augured well for future good roads. Mr. Gaddis expressed the desire that some day Alliance would have a state highway connecting them with the state highway at Scottsbluff.

He explained the purpose of the surveying party that was going over the Potash highway the following day. The road has been surveyed once, and the party will Friday select the road that will be made permanent. When completed, a passable road will be had from Alliance to Grand Island, Neb.

Mr. Gaddis was asked by Cub Elheim what the present status of the North Star and G-P-C highways were. He explained that both county boards had passed resolutions recommending that the North Star highway be made along the track south from Alliance, but that the operations were necessarily limited due to insufficient funds. Morrill county's quota, he explained, has been practically tied up with the graveling project now under way.

To the best of his knowledge, he said, the Broadwater road had as yet been designated as a state highway.

William F. Hart was then called upon. He responded with a few well-selected stories with southern dinkies as the principal. Mr. Hart explained that there was nothing left for him to say, inasmuch as Mr. Gaddis had covered the road situation so thoroughly, and was better acquainted with local conditions.

Assessor's Valuation of Box Butte County Shows \$132,388 Gain

County Assessor John Pilkington Wednesday made public figures in connection with total valuations in Box Butte county. He is able to furnish accurate figures on all property that comes directly under his jurisdiction but is compelled to estimate the valuation of the Burlington railroad, and other corporations such as the Northwestern Bell Telephone company, Western Union Telegraph company, the Pullman company, and The American Express company. The total valuation, as compiled by County Assessor Pilkington, amounts to \$15,316,588, as compared with \$15,184,000 for the previous year.

Until recently, the county assessor explains, it was his duty to fix the valuation of the public utility corporations, but this duty has been transferred to the state board of equalization. The table given below necessarily estimates the figures given for these interests, because, while the state board has been in session since May 29, it has as yet returned no valuation for Box Butte county.

The gain shown by the table amounts to an increased valuation of \$132,388, although this may be charged somewhat by the valuation of the state board of equalization.

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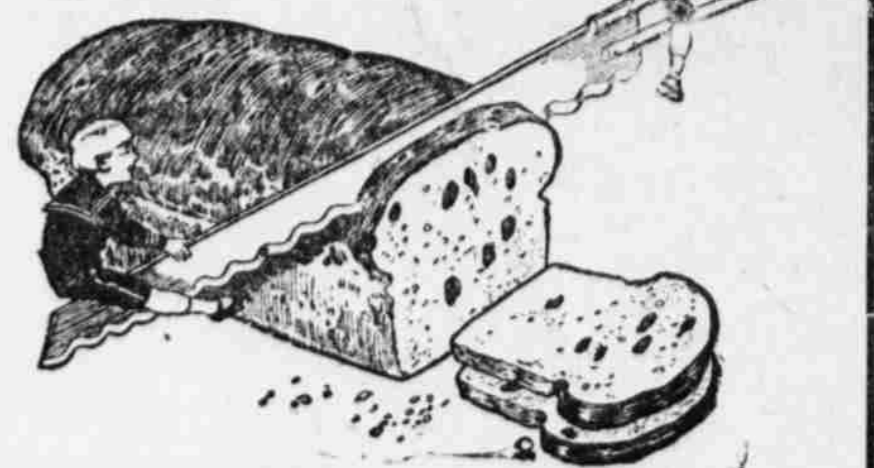


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
