They are about evenly matched for experience. Both prefer to box at a long range, as neither cares for the infighting part of the game. O'Connor is believed to be a comer, and will get his first real bout in this show. He appeared before in a four-round exhibition with Lloyd Dotson and made a favorable showing. Should he beat Wyland, he will be in line for more fights with the local post of the Legion.

Preparations are being made to care for the crowd in an efficient and systematic manner, and those in charge of the bout believe that his show will draw the largest crowd that has yet attended.
