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 The county judge who assessed them, who has taken the position that some leniency should be shown for the first violation, although the stand is taken that subsequent violations of this law, as long as it is in force, will be dealt with much more harshly.

Muskrat Trapping Profitable.

The trapping of muskrat furs during the past season was the financial salvation of many ranchmen in the western Nebraska sandhill cattle country, for this territory was hit a terrific blow by the financial depression, which still rests heavily on the cattlemen, and had it not been for the money received from muskrat furs many families would have been homeless and hungry in this district. The muskrat thrives in the sandhill lake region and expert fur men and trappers insist that the furs are prime from January 1 to April 1 and that this should be the open season, instead of closing it on February 15. The purpose of the present closing date is to protect the females and young, as the mating season starts shortly after the middle of February.

A determined effort will be made during the coming session of the Nebraska legislature to have the dates of the trapping season changed to conform to the season of prime furs. As long as the cattle industry is in the dumps, the muskrat fur industry will continue to be probably the leading cash "crop" of the sandhills and those who are interested in the industry insist that they be allowed to trap while the furs are prime. However, it is quite certain that future violations of the game laws will be few and far between.

Hunting Prospects Excellent.

Prospects for the prairie chicken and grouse "crop" this summer are the best ever seen in the sandhills and excellent hunting is in prospect for this fall. Game wardens will be scattered through the hunting district during the late summer and fall with orders to apprehend all violators of the state and federal game laws. The opening of the shooting season is considered too late under the present laws and a determined effort will be made by western sportsmen during the next session of the state legislature to have the opening dates of the season set ahead from fifteen to thirty days.

Antelope, which are protected by a closed season under both state and government laws, are now scattered all through the sandhill and prairie districts of western Nebraska. One herd is near Hyannis, while other herds have been seen recently near Sidney and between Alliance and Scottsbluff.
