



Victory for the Heathen. SEATTLE, Wash., Aug. 31.—Justice Hanford, in the case of Chinamen or-dered deported to China by United States Commissioner Craney, decided that all except the first and last sections of the act of Sept. 13,1883, are in force, although the treaty with China was never rati-fied. Chinamen can now appeal from the commissioner's decision and be tried by district judges. This is the first decision on this law. Ten Chinamen have secured trials and been discharged.
