In short, semiofficial utterances have it that Mr. Deuprey will state that neither himself nor his colleagues have ever enter-tained the idea of disputing the testimony of Mrs. Vogel and the three normal school girls to the effect that Durrant joined Blanche Lamont at Clay and Powell streets at 3 p. m. on April 3. He will admit that the young woman and the medical student got on the car together and rode in the direction of Market street.
