Porte Given Final Warning by the Powers to Act Quickly.

FORCEFUL METHODS NEXT.

Important Meeting of the Diplomats of European Nations—Total Number of Armenians Killed in Recent Massacres Exceeds Ten Thousand.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Nov. 11.—As a result of the exchange of numerous telegrams between the representatives of the powers and their respective governments, an important meeting of the ambassadors was held here today.

THE number of victims of the Baidur massacre is now reported to be 1,500, and it is estimated that the total number of Armenians, men, women and children killed during all the most recent massacres exceeds 10,000, and the total is being constantly added to.

HAD A REASSURING EFFECT. Uneasy Feeling Throughout Europe Quieted by Salisbury's Speech.

LONDON, Nov. 11.—The Marquis of Salisbury's speech of Saturday, delivered at the lord mayor's banquet, seems to have had a good effect here and elsewhere throughout Europe.

CLIMAX IN ST. JOE CHURCH ROW. Leaders in the Fight Against the Pastor and Bishop Excommunicated.

ST. JOSEPH, Nov. 11.—A climax was reached in the troubles of the Polish Catholic church in this city yesterday when an order from Bishop Burke was received excommunicating four of the men charged with having been responsible for the dissension.

Imported Servants Are Exempt. TOPEKA, Nov. 11.—Judge Foster, in the United States district court, decided that Ferguson, the Kansas City, Kan., man who imported an alien laborer did not violate the federal statutes in that the man was simply employed as a servant, holding that this class of foreigners are exempt from the provisions of the law.

VICTORY FOR EDISON.

Supreme Court Upholds His Incandescence Lamp Patents.

STANFORD CASE ADVANCED.

Hearing of Arguments Set For the First Monday in January and Each Side Given an Hour's Additional Time to Present Their Case.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 11.—The United States supreme court today advanced the arguments of the Stanford case, setting it for the first Monday in January and giving an hour's additional time to each side for argument.

The supreme court also decided the important case of the Consolidated Electric Light company against the Sawyer-Mann patents.

Justice Bradley, in his opinion in the lower court, which the decision today affirms, said that Sawyer and Mann followed a wrong principle in their work upon the incandescence light; that of small resistance in the conductor and a strong current.

The supreme court today denied the motion to advance the case of Broker E. R. Chapman of New York, indicted for refusing to testify before the senate committee during the sugar trust investigation.

POWDER MILL EXPLODES. Two Men Blown to Atoms and the Plant Demolished at Marquette.

MARQUETTE, Mich., Nov. 11.—The Marquette Powder company's mill, situated about six miles from the city, exploded today. The entire structure was demolished and two men were blown to atoms.

Paritan Still on the Rocks.

NEW LONDON, Conn., Nov. 11.—An attempt to haul the steamer Paritan off her rocky bed at Great Gull island with the two tugs J. A. Walcott and T. A. Scott, Jr., late yesterday afternoon during a moderately high tide, resulted in giving the boat a list to port, and the tugs ceased their efforts, fearing that damage would result if the strain was continued while she lay in the position she had assumed.

Confirmed the Lake Erie Sale. NEW YORK, Nov. 11.—Judge Lacob, in the United States circuit court today, handed down a decision confirming the sale of the New York, Lake Erie and Western railway made on Nov. 7 by a master, and which is in line with the Morgan syndicate's plan of reorganization.

Additional Indemnity For Japan. WASHINGTON, Nov. 11.—The Japanese minister has received a telegram to the effect that a convention has been signed at Peking providing for the payment of an additional indemnity by China for the evacuation of the Liao Tung peninsula.

Death of Dr. Norris. SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 11.—Dr. Basil Norris, a retired army surgeon, who resided for many years at Washington, died in this city last night.

Job For a Cincinnati Man. WASHINGTON, Nov. 11.—The attorney general has appointed Henry Rehton of Cincinnati disbursing officer of the department of justice, vice Frank Branegan, who resigned to accept a similar position in the department of state.
