SITUATION AT CONSTANTINOPLE.

Representatives of the Powers Waiting Sir Philip Currie's Return.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Nov. 14.—There is very little change in the situation here today. The Italian fleet is understood to be on its way to Salonica to join the British fleet.

Further troubles are also reported at Kharput, Malitch and Arabkir, and at Marash the bloodshed and outrages are said to have been even more terrible and prolonged than at Erzeroum.

During the rioting at Marash, Hatjin and Orfah the American missionaries, thanks to the strong representations made on the subject to the porte by the United States ambassador, Mr. Terrell, were protected by Turkish gendarmes.

Abdullah Pasha, formerly president of the Sassoun bureau of inquiry, and Saibden Pasha have been sent to Erzeroum and Bitlis respectively to take command of the Turkish troops in these places.

INSURGENTS MOVE ON SANTA CLARA. General Campos Preparing to Give Battle to the Combined Cuban Forces.

MADRID, Nov. 14.—Dispatches received here from Havana say that the insurgent leader, Roloff, is at Sigüenza, province of Santa Clara, awaiting Maximilian Gomez, at the head of a force of insurgents, and with the intention of advancing upon the city of Santa Clara.

Gomez recently changed his tactics of attempting to tire out the Spanish troops owing to the decision of the Cuban revolutionary assembly in New York, which is understood to consider it urgent that the insurgents bring about a decisive engagement with the troops.

DECIDED AGAINST THE RAILROAD. Northern Pacific Loses Eight Hundred Thousand Acres of Land.

HINRICHSSEN TO HESING.

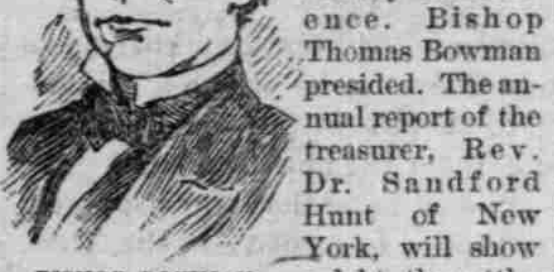
Effort to Harmonize the Illinois Facts with a Failure.
