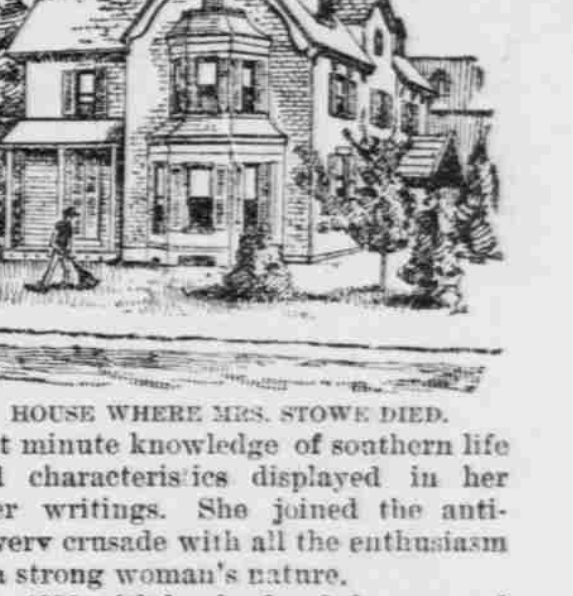
MRS. STOWE IS DEAD. THE AUTHORESS OF "UNCLE TOM'S CABIN" PASSES AWAY.
