At her bedside were three members of the family, Mrs. Isabelle Beecher Hooker, her husband, Dr. Hooker, and Harriet Stowe, a daughter of the authoress. Throughout the forenoon the friends of Mrs. Stowe gathered in the room, waiting for the end.
