### COMMISSIONERS PROCEEDINGS.

July 9th, 1897.

The following resolution was offered by Thomson: Now on this 9th day of July, 1897, the bondsmen on the repository bond of the North Platte National Bank to Lincoln county met with the board in the county clerk's office in answer to the citation by said board to confer in regard to the county deposit in said bank. The report of the bondsmen showed that they had on June 19th called upon Receiver Doolittle of said bank and requested information as to assets, liabilities, expenses, etc. This information being refused by the receiver, application was made to Comptroller Eckles through Senator Thurston for such information as would enable the bondsmen to answer reasonable demand of said county board. On Friday, July 2, a letter was received from Comptroller Eckles stating a special examiner had been ordered to go to North Platte to join the receiver and a committee of the creditors and shareholders in an examination of the affairs of said bank and give fullest information in every detail. A committee of the bondsmen sought information as to when special examiner would be here, and was informed that one J. W. Blee had been here and gone, and that he would return July 10th to meet the depositors and shareholders to select a committee. Why the date was fixed later than the time for the bondsmen to report to this board, or why it was necessary for said special examiner to make two visits, or why said examiner had failed to call upon the board or any of the bondsmen and confer upon this important matter, the board has no information. It is ordered that this hearing be continued until such time as information concerning the condition of said bank shall be obtained by the bondsmen, or until the further order of this board. Hardin and Garrison voted no; Thomson yes. The resolution failed to carry.

The following resolution was then offered by Hardin—Now on this 9th day of July, 1897, the bondsmen on the repository bond of the North Platte National Bank to Lincoln county met with the board in the county clerk's office in answer to request of said board to confer in regard to the county deposits in said bank. On statement that an examination of the affairs of the bank was ordered by the comptroller, it is ordered by the board that further action be deferred for the present. Resolution carried.
