### A Red Letter Day.

Sunday was a red letter day in the history of Methodism in North Platte. On that day the magnificent new church edifice was dedicated without one cent of indebtedness upon it. The building itself cost a trifle less than \$6,000. The total cost of the church fully equipped with steam heating apparatus, lights, pews and other furniture, and windows was \$8375. Of this amount \$5375 had already been raised but the additional \$3000 had to be raised before the church could be dedicated. At the morning and evening services the splendid sum of \$3047.53 was pledged and in the evening the church, entirely free from debt, was dedicated.

The first service of the day was held at half past ten. The church's seating capacity is estimated at 600. Every pew was occupied at this service and it was necessary to place chairs in the aisles and vestibules to accommodate the throng of people that was in attendance. The service was opened with a hymn which was followed by an eloquent prayer by Presiding Elder Leonard. An anthem by the choir completed the opening part of the service and Dr. Lewis Curtis, the preacher of the day, was then introduced by the pastor, Rev. C. C. Wilson. Dr. Curtis took as his subject "The all conquering power of faith." He portrayed in a vivid manner the power of faith in all the pursuits of every day life and of all the enterprises undertaken and very plainly proved that without faith a state of anarchy and disorder would soon ensue. Then he spoke of faith in higher things, the faith of the Christian in his Saviour and how it made him invulnerable to all the trials and woes of this present life? Dr. Curtis closed his sermon by telling how a few faithful people, who had faith in the Lord, faith in Methodism and faith in North Platte and its citizens, when the old church burned down immediately went to work to build a new church and that there remained a balance due on the new church of \$3000 which he wished the congregation to pledge. Over \$2000 was pledged then and the balance was pledged in the evening.

In the afternoon the usual Sunday School service was held. It was followed by a baptismal service at which eighteen children were baptized. At seven o'clock the Epworth League held a praise service to appropriately express their joy in the work so nobly begun and so nobly ended. This service was followed by the usual evening service which was attended by a congregation which was even larger than the one in the morning. Dr. Curtis preached another very stirring sermon. When the last few dollars needed were raised the church was formally dedicated.

The church was very beautifully decorated with potted plants and cut flowers, banks of sweet peas and nasturtiums almost entirely hiding the outlines of the altar furniture.

The old church which was erected in 1882 burned down December 7, 1898. The erection of the new church was actually commenced on April 2, 1899, although prior to that date some preliminary stone cutting work had been done. Rev. Wilson, the pastor of the church, is a stirring energetic man and the rapid erection of the present church is largely due to his efforts ably seconded by those of the trustees, W. J. Crusen, A. McMichael, J. C. Piercy, J. G. Beeler, and F. L. Mooney. The members and the various church organizations have made great sacrifices on behalf of the new church and the outside citizens responded quite liberally to the appeal for help.

The building is one of which every citizen of North Platte may justly feel proud as it is one of the finest church buildings in Nebraska. When it is entirely finished it will be very comfortably furnished and will present a very attractive appearance both inside and outside. The pastor, trustees, and members of the congregation deserve the hearty congratulations of every one for the noble work they have done and the successful completion of the church.
