New Masonic Temple.

At a regular meeting of the Platte Valley Lodge A. F. and A. M. held Tuesday evening the project of building a new Masonic temple was freely discussed. The members were practically unanimous in declaring that in their estimation the proper time to commence making preparations to build a temple which would be a credit to them and also to the town had arrived. F. E. Bullard, C. F. Iddings and Charles McDonald were appointed a committee to consider and investigate the ways and means and report to the lodge. It is quite possible that active building operations will not commence this season as there are a great many preliminary financial arrangements to be made and they will necessarily consume some time and probably necessitate postponing building until next year. Part of the building and loan stock which the masons own will not be available until March 1901. There is no doubt but that the temple will be built and that when it is built it will be one of the finest in Nebraska. If it is found impossible to commence building operations this year they will be commenced very early in 1901.
