Railroad Notes.

Engine No. 611 was brought down from the Wyoming division and put in the shops for an overhauling.

Engine No. 1403 is out of the shops and being broken in before going back on its regular passenger run.

Judge W. D. Cornish occupied the special car Astoria on train No. 101 Wednesday afternoon. He was enroute to Portland.

H. C. Langdon resumed his duties as traveling engineer Wednesday. With the present method of handling the engines a traveling engine is an absolute necessity.

Another shifting in engines has taken place. The 1500s which were in service on the Third district have been sent back to the Fourth district. They will be succeeded on the third by 1700s and more of the standards will go back into service on the east end.

A car of potatoes from Greely was stored in the machine shops yesterday to keep the contents from freezing. Several cars of other perishable freight were run into the round house and two orange specials were tied up west of here on account of the cold weather.

The following is the capacity of the several Union Pacific ice-houses: house No. 1, 1482 tons; house No. 2, 2426 tons; house No. 3, 2833 tons; house No. 4, 4169 tons; house No. 5, east room, 2740 tons, middle room, 2800 tons; west room 2740 tons. The total capacity of all of them is 19,189 tons. About 2,000 tons more of ice are needed to entirely fill the houses. The elevator has been placed in position and is being used on house No. 5. It works splendidly and stows away ice so rapidly that it keeps a large force of men at work feeding the carriers. No ice was cut at Pawnee yesterday but shipments will be resumed today.

John Garbers, of Chapman, is perfecting a mail crane which it is thought will prove to be very superior to any crane now in use. Garbers was with Rasmussen, a member of Co. M of the Second Nebraska at the time Rasmussen was killed by a mail crane and the accident set him to thinking if it wasn't possible to invent a less dangerous device. The new crane drops two feet away from the car as soon as the mail bag it is to deliver to the car has been received. It will also hold the mail bag to be delivered to the station which will avoid its being thrown haphazard to the ground.
