The receipts at the separator station Wednesday amounted to thirty-five hundred pounds of milk, a large increase over the receipts of any previous Wednesday. The checks for last month's butter fat were received last week and \$350 was distributed among the patrons. Those who have recently commenced selling the butter fat to the creamery company in preference to making the butter themselves are all very well satisfied with the returns. For the first thirty days the company allows its patrons to use the cans free of charge so there is really no expense attached to sending milk to the station for thirty days and at the expiration of that time the sender can tell very accurately whether the returns from it are satisfactory.
