A Strong Southern Play.

The "Knobs o' Tennessee" deals with the moonshiners and the troubles that are continually occurring between them and the goverument officials. Joe Preston is a leader among these men, yet mentally not of that character. A pleasing love story runs through the play in which Preston and Madeline Bailey, the cultured daughter of a wealthy resident of Nashville, are the principals. There are many romantic and pathetic scenes as well as thrilling ones, and the author has provided ample comedy. At the end of the second act Harry Preston's mother shoots him just as he is being taken to prison, to save him from hanging. This scene is well worked and never fails to win the audience. A novel feature of a later scene is the introduction of President McKinley in his private office. Preston and his son appear to plead for a pardon for the latter and his mother, which is granted. The play was a pronounced hit last season and is admitted by those who have seen it again this season to be far superior in every way to last year's production. It will be seen at the opera house Friday evening, March 16th.

District Court.

The March term of the district court opened Monday morning with Judge H. M. Sullivan on the bench. The first case that came up for trial was the well known case of the T. C. Austin Mfg Co. vs. W. M. Hinman. The evidence in the case was submitted to the jury on Monday and the arguments were made Tuesday morning. It went to the jury in the afternoon and they brought in a verdict in the evening in favor of the plaintiff awarding a judgment of \$784. This case may be taken to the supreme court. The next case was Jas. P. Egan vs. B. Beer which was tried Wednesday. The case is a contest over the ownership of a section of railroad land. A yerdict was rendered Wednesday evening in favor of the plaintiff and awarded him \$120 rental for the land. The case will also probably be appealed to the supreme court. During Monday D. A. Baker, who had given bonds for the appearance of Lewis Woodruff at this term of court, was instructed to bring him into court but as neither of them appeared the bond was declared forfeited.

State vs Chas. Blakeslee and the State vs F. L. Disbro. The former plead guilty to the charge of breaking into a Union Pacific box the Bertrand circuit and Rev. Derybery, of Gandy, has been breaking into a Union Pacific box car on the night of December fourth and was sentenced to one year in the penitentiary and to pay the costs of the prosecution. District plead guilty to a charge of petit larcency and was sentenced to ten days in jail, to pay the costs of prosecution and make restitution to the Union Pacific of twenty dollars, the value of the goods which were taken from the car. Both men were let off rather easily because of the fact that they turned state's evidence. After the verdicts were rendered in these cases the jurymen were discharged and the court has since been occupied in hearing equity cases, motions, demurrers, etc.
