THE republican congressional convention of this district will be held at Kearney on April 26th for the purpose of nominating a candidate for congress and selecting two delegates and two alternates to the national convention. Lincoln county is entitled to thirteen votes in the convention.

The delegates in the three state conventions held in Lincoln this week bent their knees in tawning to the great Bryan and his control was supreme. All platforms were submitted to him for approval, and all the business transacted was on lines suggested by him. Had a delegate the temerity to question Bryan's autocracy he would have been crushed through the floor of the hall.

THE Sheldon plan of conducting earthly matters has been taken up by the mayor of a West Virginia town, who announces that he will conduct municipal affairs "as Jesus would." The result of this innovation will be watched with considerable interest. Almost every town of any size could be Sheldonized to a great extent and the result would prove beneficial to the people.

THE Omaha Bee, in an editorial, says the republicans of Douglas county have sunk all factional feeling and will enter the campaign of 1900 in a compact and harmonious phalanx. This is good news. Factional strife in Omaha has in times past resulted disastrously to the republican party of the state; but if harmony prevails this year and the proper work is done, Douglas county's republican majority will go far toward redeeming Nebraska from the fusionists.

POPULISTS of the middle-of-the-road wing fared badly at the state convention in Lincoln Monday, and they were unceremoniously elevated through the transom. This element will issue a call for a state convention to nominate a ticket and will also elect delegates to the Cincinnati convention. This action will probably determine the real strength of the middle-of-the-roads in the state. In our opinion their influence in state politics will be greater than some people think.

THOUGH the republicans in this congressional district have been defeated for ten years past, they are not dismayed and will nominate a candidate and earnestly work for

his election. For several years past the fusion majority has been diminishing, and this year a strong republican candidate will have, in our opinion, a fair chance to win. During the past year there has been a slump to the republican party all through the district, and with the general feeling of dissatisfaction among the better class of populists in regard to the demo-populist alliance, there is ground for hopes of republican success. As we understand it, there are no avowed candidates for the nomination but it is said that Judge Kinkaid will again make the race if the nomination is tendered him.

In the evening the members of the newly organized lodge tendered the district inspector and the members of the O. R. C. a banquet at the lodge dining room. The new lodge is the fifth one to be organized in the state and as its corps of officers is a very able one it will undoubtedly be successful.

Wednesday Judge Sullivan overruled the motion for a new trial in the Dinsmore murder case. Before sentencing him the judge addressed the following remarks to him, "You may be innocent, but you have had a fair and impartial trial and, while I am sorry the jury did not fix the penalty at life imprisonment instead of death, which is a reflection on civilization, I believe the evidence warrants a verdict of guilty." He then sentenced him to be hanged by the neck until dead, in the Dawson county, Nebraska, jail on July 20, 1900, the first anniversary of his marriage. An appeal will be made to the supreme court by Dinsmore's attorneys, for a new trial.

The jury in the Harris case at Hartington brought in a verdict of not guilty after being out only two hours. Harris, who is editor of the paper at Belden, shot and killed John Bleunkin several months ago. He set up a plea of self defence which held good.
