It was exhibited by the Baldwin company at Berlin and the new engines ordered by the Siberian railway will be built after the same model. It has a record of a hundred miles in seventy minutes and carries 205 pounds of steam. Its cylinders are 24x26. It is fitted up with every modern convenience, including an electric headlight and an electric apparatus for ringing the bell.
