A Japanese lady in native costume, who was a passenger on train No. 6 Wednesday morning. attracted considerable attention from the bystanders at the station.


Mrs. J. H. Turpie and children are expected to arrive here from Lafayette in a few weeks. They will spend the summer here and may decide to locate here permanently.

Death of Robert Arundale.

Robt. Arundale died in Denver Tuesday morning of pneumonia complicated by asthma. He had been ill for two week but when he was first taken sick he thought that it was simply a cold which had aggravated the asthma from which he had suffered for a good many years and did not send any word to his family for several days. He contracted the cold while out colecting during the stormy weather. The remains were brought to North Platte and were buried from the Church of Our Saviour Wednesday afternoon.

Mr. Arundale was born in Walton, Yorkshire, England. Oct. 8, 1845, In 1870 he married Miss Self. They had one child, a daughter who is now Mrs. H. Gilfoyle. In 1878 the family moved to the United States and located near Des Moines. From there in 1882 they moved to the vicinity of Lincoln where they resided until 1886 when they moved to the northeastern part of Lincoln county. They lived there until the daughter was married when they moved to North Platte. A few months ago a very good opening in the shape of a partnership with G. R. Golvin, an old triend of his, in the commission business in Denver appeared and Mr. Arundale took advantage of it. At the time of his death the business was exceedingly prosperous. He was an honest, upright man aud although some-what radical in his opinions they were the result of his conscientious belief. He had scores of friends to whom his death causes much new home in Syracuse.
