At the regular meeting of the Commercial Club last evening the entire time was devoted to discussions relative to the street fair concessions. The matter of charging merchants for the street frontage of their business places was considered, and though a large majority of the members were in favor of making a charge, no definite action was taken. A committee was appointed to interview those who were opposed to making a charge for the fronts, and that duty was performed this morning. The result was that all withdrew their objections to the plan of charging for the space, and the matter is now definitely settled. Merchants will be charged fifty cents per foot, while non-residents must pay one dollar per foot.

**The Street Fair.**

Everything connected with the street fair to be held Sept. 3rd to 8th inclusive is moving along in excellent shape, and all indications point to a large attendance and a week of enjoyment for all who are present. The fair has already been well advertised throughout central and western Nebraska, and commercial travelers say they find much interest in the fair manifested in all the towns they visit in this part of the state.

The amusement committee is preparing a very elaborate program, including ball games, trap shooting, tennis games, foot races, and a dozen other contests that go to make a good program of sports. In addition to these there will be free street attractions, consisting of song and dance artists, contortionists, wire walkers, fire eaters and other features. There will also be daily balloon ascensions.

There will be attractions of a midway nature, such as dancing girls of all nations, moving pictures, vaudeville acts, and other amusement for which concessions will be made and an admission fee charged. There will be merry-go-rounds, museums, etc., galore. No gambling devices of any nature, whatever, will be permitted.

The committee on public comfort will secure grounds for the accommodation of farmers' teams, and water and hay will be provided and furnished free. This will give those who come by wagon an opportunity to camp out if they so desire.

Merchants will erect attractive booths in front of their places of business, some of which will be used for the display of wares, while others will be provided with chairs and be made a resting place for women and children. The main streets will be decorated with flags and bunting.

Band concerts will be given each afternoon and evening, and arrangements will be made for dancing pavilions.

It is the intention of the management to have matters so arranged that the visitors will be entertained from morning until late at night, to the end that all who attend will go home well pleased with their visit.

**Railroad Notes.**

Harry Cox has returned from Iowa and resumed his trick in the dispatcher's office.

Engine 985 was sent down from Cheyenne yesterday and will be overhauled in the shops here.

Charley Seyferth returned Sunday from Sidney where he had been working as relief machinist for a week.

John Lonergan started west Saturday night in search of a climate which will alleviate the unpleasantness of hay fever, with which he is afflicted.

The torch and oil box at the ice houses caught fire Sunday night and an alarm of fire was turned in, but employees extinguished the flames before the arrival of the hose companies. The damage was very light.

The recent order regarding standard time-pieces goes into effect tomorrow. This order provides that all U. P. train crews and yard men shall provide themselves with a watch of a prescribed jewel standard. Nearly all the train men are owners of watches which meet the requirements, but those who are not, must purchase new time-pieces.

One of the fast runs recently made on the U. P. was that of train 102, engine 1802, George Austin engineer, and made between North Platte and Alda. The distance is 130 miles and it was covered in 130 minutes including two stops, one at Kearney and one at Lexington. The distance from North Platte to Grand Island is 137 1/2 miles and the entire distance was made in 145 minutes, the distance from Alda to Grand Island being impeded by a loss of at least seven minutes sidetrack to allow a train to pass. A mile a minute was the time for the entire distance.—Grand Island Independent.

Two of the sixty new engines ordered by the Union Pacific last March were received in Omaha Saturday and it is expected the order will now be filled at the rate of two per week. The engines received are numbered 1623 and 1624. Two of the four cylinders are high pressure and the other two low pressure. The high pressure cylinders are fifteen and one-half inches in diameter, the low pressure cylinders twenty-six inches in diameter. Both have a thirty-inch stroke. The driving wheels are fifty-seven inches in diameter and support a weight of 160,000 pounds. The weight of the engine is 180,000 pounds; tank, 105,000 pounds; the total weight of engine and tank, ready for service, being 285,000 pounds. The tank has a capacity of 5,000 gallons of water and sixteen tons of coal. The working boiler pressure is 200 pounds of steam to the square inch. There are a total of 306 boiler tubes, each two inches in diameter and thirteen feet six inches in length. As fast as the engines are received and got in shape for service they will be sent to the Wyoming division, and the 1700 class now in use there will be sent back to the Nebraska division.
