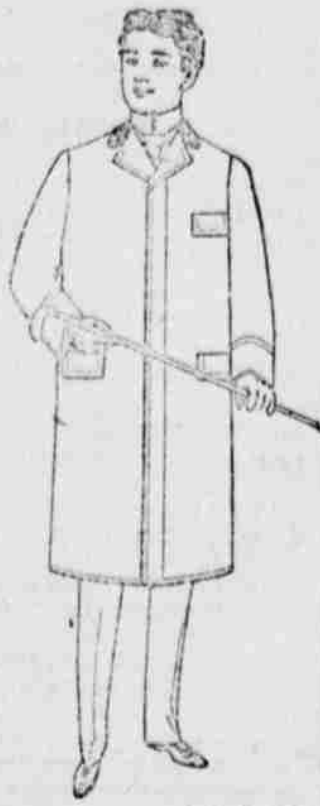
The great money raising sale at the Fair Store will commence Monday the 5th.

James Wilson died at his residence in the First ward Wednesday evening at 8:30 o'clock of neuralgia of the stomach, with which he had been affected at intervals, although his last sickness was but of a week's duration.

The deceased came to North Platte about thirty years ago, and for many years worked as a blacksmith in the Union Pacific shops. He served as mayor of the city for a term or two and was twice elected councilman from his ward. Mr. Wilson was an upright man, a consistent member of the Presbyterian church and a good citizen. He had been for many years an active member of the Masonic lodge, and the funeral will be under the auspices of that order.

The deceased was sixty-seven years of age and leaves a wife and one son, the latter living in Chicago, to mourn the loss of a kind husband and father.
