The adjourned term of district court opened this morning and will continue in session two or three days. The Rennie case will be called this afternoon or tomorrow morning.


The city council will meet tonight and among the business to be transacted will be the allowance of the final dividend on the 1896 claims and a consideration of the electric light proposition.


