COUNTY PRECINCT NEWS.

BETWEEN THE RIVERS.

W. A. Paxton of Omaha is transacting business at his ranch in the valley.

Mr. and Mrs. D. M. Leyboldt of Hershey were transacting business and visiting friends at the county seat Saturday last.

J. W. Prickett postmaster at Hershey is reported as critically ill at this time.

Miss Lindia Layton is said to be gradually sinking with but little hope of her recovery.

Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Hershey of North Platte were up to their ranch in the valley on Monday of this week.

An injunction has been served on the two school directors of the Nichols school who permitted the school building to be used for club dances for a time. The case will be brought up at the next term of district court.

W. J. Shinkle will put up about 3,000 acres of hay this season for Seeberger & Co. of Hershey. About 1,800 acres of it is old canal company's land which they have purchased on the ground and the balance they have purchased of other parties. The above would make a large stack of hay if all was put in one. It will probably be baled and shipped as fast as possible.
