Evangeline.

Among the many stories of the tyranny of England toward her colonies in the 16th and 17th centuries, that of the exile of the Acadians from their homes in the land now known as Nova Scotia, holds a prominent place.

Contented and peace loving, satisfied to work out their own destiny, the picture of the pastoral life of the Acadians is one beautiful to behold. Then comes the mandate from King George of England and at once the picture changes to one of desolation. Families are separated, wives torn from husbands and children from mothers, and left scattered among the English colonies all along the Atlantic coast, where most perished from starvation and exposure. A few were taken to Louisiana and a few finally returned to their native land after innumerable hardships, and there their descendants may be seen living in much the same manner of two hundred years ago. Among these the story of Evangeline is a tradition looked upon as sacred and in delineating the characters and events in a beautiful epic H. W. Longfellow has made the story familiar to all English speaking people and has endeared himself to the hearts of all Americans.

The production of Evangeline and the Exile of the Acadians at the opera house Saturday evening, Oct. 19, will faithfully reproduce all the scenes and characters so glowingly described by Longfellow. Evangeline, the belle of the village of Grand Pre, is seen in her home, busy with her spinning wheel, filling her old father's pipe, comforting him in his troubles and later displaying a love and faithfulness that finds a parallel only in Ruth and Ester of biblical fame and one that can but prove a noble example to old and young alike. The entire cast of over one hundred people will appear in the picturesque costume of the Acadians and incidentally will be introduced a butterfly ballet by sixteen young ladies that is worth going miles to see. The cast of characters will be announced soon and seats should be reserved early at Clinton's.
