We are in receipt of a letter from Governor Savage in which he invites us when in Lincoln to drop in to see him and talk over the Bartley pardon. Some friends of the governor has evidently called his attention to the article recently appearing in these columns and he probably thinks we have been a little too severe on him. Nothing, however, that Governor Savage can say regarding his action in pardoning Bartley would change our opinion of the governor or his act, hence if we should go to Lincoln prior to the state convention it is not likely we would find time to call on him. We hope, however, to be in Lincoln during the state convention and will devote whatever influence we may have in defeating the governor's nomination. We will do this in the interests of clean politics, and for the reason that we are confident that the nomination of Savage means his defeat at the polls. Nebraska has been won back to the republican ranks on the promise that the party would give the people a cleaner and better administration than did the fusionists, and unless those promises are kept defeat will follow. In pardoning embezzler Bartley, Governor Savage has made the first move toward making his party the minority party in the state, and if the state-convention nominates him the final move toward that end will be made. We recognize the fact that some of the smoothest schemers in the state are backing Savage and it may be possible that they can secure his nomination but they cannot secure his election. And not only will Savage be defeated, but the fact that his name is on the ticket will lose to the other candidates thousands of votes.

The land leasing bill now before congress is raising a storm of protests from the small stock growers of western Nebraska and their opposition is well founded. On another page will be found an article on the subject by Mr. Calhoun in which he states the case plainly from the stand point of the small stock grower. The passage of the lease bill would be detrimental not only to the small stock grower, but to the business man in every town in western Nebraska. With the former it means a "freeze-out" and to the latter loss of patronage. It is much better for the merchant if one thousand head of cattle are held and owned by six or eight men than to have them owned by one man or one company, for instead of selling goods to one family he sells to six or eight families. It is therefore to the interests of the merchant to unite with the small cattle growers and urge their representative in congress to vote against the bill.

The State Record, Frank Harrison's new paper, is doing a good work in giving publicity to the Bartley pardon and showing up the gang of party destroyers who are backing Governor Savage in his canvass for the gubernatorial nomination. The State Record has a good opportunity to show up the political rotteness of the old-time Lincoln gang—the fellows who by their acts threw the state into the fusionist column—and we know that Mr. Harrison has the nerve to use that opportunity.
